Graft at Ellis Island

NEW YORK, July 15.—The existence of a widespread system of graft at the United States immigration service at Ellis Island was disclosed today, following an announcement of the fact that red-ribboned August P. Schell, head of the law division on Tuesday for five days without paying pending decision on serious charges against Schell.

It is impossible to say how much money has been extorted from immigrants and deportees in the past, but Commissioner Wallis declared he has found conditions so bad that he estimates \$500,000 a year as the potential graft. Thousands are said to have been taken from millions ignorant of American customs, language and monetary values. Many immigrants whose admission to this country has been against the interests of the United States, have been allowed to enter and some who should have been deported have been unduly favored.

Previous to the suspension of Schell, a dozen inspectors, interpreters and watchmen were tried and discharged. Some have been arrested for preying on aliens. Schell is the most important official against whom charges have yet been brought but an investigation is being made to learn whether he was "protected" by a high official at Washington under the former administration. General Schell filed a formal reply to the charges against him but is expected to do so within the five days of his suspension.

Strange Sect in B. C.

VANCOUVER, July 15.—One of the strangest religious sects on the American continent is negotiating for the purchase of large area of land in Langley Prairie, in the Fraser Valley, a short distance from Vancouver, where it is proposed to establish a colony of "The Tongues of Living Fire." Twelve families are coming from Michigan as advance guard of the Tongues, and the others will follow within a few months. It is not quite certain whether the head-quarters of the strange sect will be moved from Michigan to British Columbia, but this is quite probable.

Elder Enoch, a patriarchal man of venerable years and identified with the sect, is heading the advance guard of the Tongues, and conducting the negotiations in this province. He is the father of 23 children by three deceased wives, having no issue by his fourth and present helpmate, a lady who is apparently his pair in age and decorum.

The Tongues of Living Fire practice strange rites which include penance for voluntary and involuntary lapses from a very rigid code of moral laws. Flagellation is said to be resorted to on occasions for the benefit of the younger members of the colony, but of this the leaders speak little, and with grave intimation that discipline is a matter for discussion only among the members of the flock.

There is no great joy among present settlers in the Langley district over the advent of the Tongues, but as they are reported to be well supplied with riches, no effort is to be made to raise up immigration bars against them.

KING CONSTANTINE WILL LEAD GREEKS

PRAGUE, July 15.—A nine-year old girl named Mary Kovarik was terribly mauled by a bear in the Prague Zoo, and died while being taken to hospital. The bear was chained to a tree. A woman threw a bun, but it fell just out of the bear's reach. This infuriated the animal, which broke the chain and dashed into a group of children. A soldier who tried to protect the girl with his bayonet was seriously injured by the bear. Police who were called to the scene had to fire thirty-seven shots with their revolvers before the animal was killed.

METHUEN, Mass., July 14.—Mrs. Placido Calvagno, wounded by her husband yesterday when he was shooting at cat, died today. Calvagno, who is awaiting a hearing on a charge of firing with a dangerous weapon, will now be charged with manslaughter, officials said.

ALLIANCE, Neb., July 15.—Several people are reported to have perished, one is known to have been killed, thousands of head of livestock have been lost, scores of ranch homes around Andrews, 17 miles west of Crawford, have been devastated by a cloudburst which deluged the White River Canyon country yesterday.

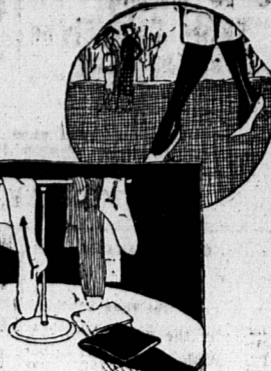
