making other allowances, such as cost of keeping scales in repair, the city should still enjoy an average annual net income of \$7,000, Coun. McKinnon stated.

Coun. J. T. McKee did not think there was that much coal weighed in the city. His information was that 44,000 loads was about the average annual number of loads weighed at the scales.

Coun. McKinnon replied that his figures were those of the Fuel Controller and that one coal dealer had weighed 37,000 loads in one year alone.

PICKARD & CO. LETTER

Mayor J. E. Blanchard and City Councilors addressed the City Clerk last night in connection with the letter from A. Pickard & Co., city coal dealer.

With regard to the proposition put forward by one of the City Councilors for the scales to be weighed on the City Scales, we commend the effort made to solve the coal weighing problem...

Now let us see what will be gained by the expenditure of this large sum of money, the only way in which we can be sure that their coal will be weighed by an independent weigher.

First let us take an order that is to be sent to C. O. D. The truckman must first go to the city scales, no matter where located, it will be a long distance from some dealer, there he weighs his coal and goes back to the yard to load the coal, from there he is told where to deliver the coal, he then goes to the city scales to weigh, the dealer must also send a clerk to the scales to price the coal, suppose there is more coal on hand ordered, this must be returned to the yard, the truckman will demand double truckage, who will pay the cost?

This is only one case of C. O. D. orders. What about the man who comes to the scales to pay cash, it would be necessary to send him to the city scales to weigh his coal, return to the yard for the coal, then back to weigh. The dealer would have to send a clerk to collect and have money with him to make payment. This would be very unsatisfactory to customers and dealers. Then there is the load that is part hard and soft coal. This would require three trips to the scales, the truckman with cartage payable on each trip.

There are many days when the weather makes it necessary for us to balance our scales several times and weigh the teams to make the scales accurate. The above are only a few of the difficulties that would be encountered should the city pass any by-law such as that proposed.

We will be glad to discuss with any member of the Council other difficulties which would be caused by such a by-law. Our firm, and I am sure all other dealers are short of men and money to handle the coal weighing with the greatest difficulty that we are able to unload cars and supply customers, to hinder our business with such a law would mean that many homes would go without coal.

We commend that the suggestion we made two years ago, that a policeman call in loads from each dealer at various times each month and weigh the coal, as proposed by the city weigher. A record to be kept of the result of each and every weighing, showing the dealer's name, weight charged, and actual weight.

S'side Deputy Mayor To Continue In Position

Town Boosts License Fees Of Transient Traders From \$50 To \$600.

A number of routine matters were taken up at the regular meeting of the Summerside town council held last evening, Deputy Mayor D. F. McNeill in the chair and all the councillors present.

A letter was read from Mayor W. Lidstone, who is still ill, asking the council to re-appoint Councilor McNeill as deputy mayor for another two months. A motion to this effect was passed.

An amendment to the town by-law was passed, motion of Councilor Wedge, seconded by Councilor Morrison, changing the license fee for transient traders from \$50 to \$600.

The following resolutions were passed: Moved by Councilor T. D. Morrison, seconded by Councilor Wedge, that the transmission line on the Linkletter road be extended its full length of about three miles more or less on the basis of each customer on this line taking service to pay said proposition of the cost of construction the sum of \$100 before being connected for service.

Moved by Councilor Morrison seconded by Councilor Wedge that the salary of Edward Harrington as operator at the electric light plant be \$25 a week and at the end of a year's service be increased to \$27 a week; and that the salary of Elmer Gray Lineman be \$22 per week.

Councilor Henry Wedge reported that all the restaurants were cooperating with the council in closing at midnight. Councilor Wedge also mentioned complaints of the condition of the dump across from M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd. on Water Street.

The deputy mayor said that Mr. Bradshaw had agreed to have it cleaned up. The town will supply a man and Mr. Bradshaw will supply one. Councilor Wedge said he thought the town should put up a fence as it is difficult to prevent people from dumping garbage on it.

Councilor Wedge reported that the tax appeal court had granted tax deductions amounting to \$18.15 - \$.

he pays, for the first 20 kilowatt hours, \$2 for the next 30 kilowatt hours at 2 1/2 cts. or 75 cts. a total of \$3.50, less a discount of 20 cts. or \$3.30; a saving monthly of \$1.8. These figures are applicable to a subscriber who would come under classification (2) as given above, where there are between seven and eight customers per mile.

Montague and Georgetown are not included in the new rate schedule. They already enjoy revised rates which, however, will be given further consideration by the Commission.

Following are the sections which will come under the new rates: Brackley Point, Wilshear, Winslow, Mount Stewart, Southport, and along the main road to (but not including) Montague and Georgetown; also St. Peter's Road, Mount Stewart, Malpeque Road from Windsor Corner to and including Hunter River, thence to New Glasgow, North Rustico, and Cavefish; also Covehead, Dalvey and Commercial Road, to Murray River and Murray Harbour.

The total customers in these districts number about 700. The Commission now has under consideration a schedule of rate reductions for commercial users.
