At the Church of England convention at Crapaud on Thursday forenoon, Rural Dean Nicholls presiding, there was an interesting discussion by the clergy and delegates of the subject of Sunday School work, its great importance and the methods of rendering it more effective for the Church. The question of assistance in connection with the Church was also discussed at some length. In the afternoon Rev. Canon Simpson delivered an address on Church Extension, pointing out that while there had been little or no extension in this province within the past twenty years, there has been considerable progress, as evidenced by the erection of new and finer churches, such as that at Crapaud, and in other ways. He offered several suggestions which were vigorously discussed, but no vote was taken. The question of the church at Springfield in relation to Crapaud and Kensington was after some discussion referred to a committee of three members—one from each of the three parishes. In the meantime, services will be held in St. Elizabeth's by Ireland Jones, a student at Saskatoon, who is spending the holidays here, by Rev. Mr. Penton and others. The nomination of a Rural Dean to succeed Rev. Mr. Nicholls, was postponed until the next Deacons' meeting. The Convention with Evening Service, held in St. John's Church, there were many present despite the wet and stormy weather. Eloquent suggestive and encouraging addresses were delivered by Justice Fitzgerald and by A. J. B. Mellish, and an excellent music recital by the delegates came to the city by the Island Thursday evening, others drove to their homes in Summerside and the country, and the remainder took the train yesterday morning.
