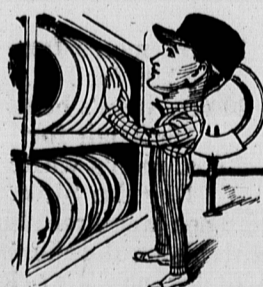

DON'T WANT RAILWAY STRIKE

CHICAGO, Oct. 24—The prospective railroad strike scheduled for October 30th limited approximately one-fourth of the country's railroad employees when the officials of the Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks, freight handlers, express and station employees, representing 350,000 men, voted last night not to authorize a walkout by their members for the time being.

MIKE MCTIGUE KNOCKS OUT BUCK GROUSE

MONTREAL, Oct. 22—After being outpointed for three rounds and dividing the honors in the next two, Mike McTigue, of New York, middleweight champion of Canada, scored a technical knockout over Buck Grouse of New York, when referee McBrearty stopped the bout in the sixth round, being of opinion that Grouse was not in a fit condition to continue. Just before this, McTigue had knocked Grouse down four times with right crosses to the jaw. The finish of the bout was one of the most spectacular witnessed in this city, Grouse being dragged to his corner after the referee's decision. He partially revived and in a half crazed condition rushed at McTigue to start fighting again. It was only by the interference of the seconds, referee and spectators that the bout was finally stopped.
In the semi-final Roddy MacDonald, of Glace Bay, knocked out Spike Sullivan, the local middleweight in the sixth round. This was the most gruelling contests witnessed in Montreal in some time. MacDonald was the first to show signs of weakening, but he rallied and fought back until Sullivan dropped from sheer exhaustion. Left and rights to the jaw finally knocked Sullivan unconscious, in which condition he remained for seven minutes.

NEW YORK, Oct. 24—Written notification that Georges Carpentier, world's light-heavyweight champion would come here to defend his title against Tom Gibbons in a bout under the auspices of Tex Rickard at Madison Square Garden next February, was received by Rickard. The information came in a letter from Francois Des camps, manager of Carpentier, and was in confirmation of a telegram from Desamps which Rickard received more than a month ago. In his communication Manager Desamps said Carpentier would arrive here either late in December or early in January, and would be prepared to defend his title in the Garden in February.

BIG DAY FOR GEERS

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 22—"Pop" Geers, veteran driver of the grand circuit, had things much his own way in the races here today. He was entered in three events and he took two of them and won second place in the other.
Geers piloted Lillian Silkwood to victory in the \$2,500, 2 1/2 mile, in a desperate struggle with Walter Cox driving Peter Kennedy in which Geers won two heats and Cox one. The 2.11 for \$1,000 went to Geers driving Duette and again it was Cox who furnished the opposition, this time holding the reins behind Lord Frisco. The 2.08 trot for \$500 was won by Dottie Day, piloted by McDonald, with Geers second driving Utah.
