JUST ONE YEAR AGO this June the fate of Christian civilization hung in the balance for a few hours, when the vast armed armada invaded the Coast of Normandy. It was the greatest gamble in history, with millions of lives and the fate of 40 nations at stake.
And now, on Monday, almost one year to the day, Canadians will go to the polls to decide, with ballots instead of bullets, whether or not Canada is to continue under its present North American form of Democracy, or whether it is to embrace a European system of "State Socialism" as proposed by the C.C.F.

Rehabilitation Conference At Kentville Ends

KENTVILLE, N.S., June 7—Winding up their three-day conference here, delegates from City of Charlottetown and other municipalities throughout the Maritimes prepared tonight to return to their home communities and put in effect lessons learned during the discussions.
The conference, first of its kind held in cities across Canada, was opened here by Mayor E. D. Reid of the Department of Veterans Affairs, Ottawa, which is sponsoring the conference.
Mr. Reid said the delegates, mainly veterans of the First Great War, would return home with a very hazy situation before the matter was finally cleared up to the satisfaction of all concerned.
