New Structure Of The Swedish Second Chamber

STOCKHOLM, Oct. 18.—The political character of the new Second Chamber of the Swedish Riksdag is primarily defined by the facts that the elections just held were a marked success for the Social Democrats, who increased their number of mandates by no less than 14 to 104, and a disappointment to the Conservatives, who lost 15 seats and now number 58, while the Peasants Party increased by 8 to 36, the Liberals kept their four seats and the Peoples Liberals, so called "Bkman Party," lost eight and now number 20. In this way the right wing of the Chamber if including the three last mentioned parties can muster a slight majority against the combined Social Democrats and Communists, the latter having retained their eight seats. The personnel of the new chamber represents a wide variety of professions. Thus, amongst 230 members there are nine professors, teachers and clergymen, eight high officials and military men, six communal or similar officials and one socialist policeman. There are, further, 11 railway and tramway employees, one lawyer, one civil engineer and 22 newspapermen. The trade unions are represented by nine officials and the industries by four industrial heads, 10 craftsmen and 18 industrial workmen. There are also four businessmen, five office employees, one estate owner, 23 farmers and five farm workers. The Chamber includes four women, three of which are Social Democrats and one Conservative. The Speaker of the Second Chamber formerly was a miner at the Graegensberg Mines.

Yield Of Fish In Maritimes Will Increase

HALIFAX, N. S., October 18.—The yield of game fish in the streams and lakes of the Maritime Provinces will be greatly increased next year due to the efforts of the Dominion Department of Fisheries in placing about 26,810,000 fry and fingerlings in these waters. Much the greater part of the total distribution made in the Maritimes up to August has consisted of Atlantic salmon, or 19,970,000 fry and fingerlings out of the total of 26,810,000, speckled trout being second with 5,790,000. Other species included brown trout, lake trout, hybrid brown trout, landlocked salmon, rainbow trout, Loch Leven trout and Kamloops trout. The Kamloops trout had not been previously set out in the Maritimes and the distribution here this year was made largely for experimental purposes. Some years ago rainbow trout were set out in some of the lakes of Halifax County but apparently never grew to maturity and after a couple of years there were no signs of them hereabouts. The Kamloops trout is indigenous to British Columbia and the fry planted here were hatched at the Yarmouth hatchery from eggs brought from one of the department's Pacific Coast plants. The distributions from the Nova Scotia hatcheries were made up of Atlantic salmon, landlocked salmon, lake trout and speckled trout from Bedford; Atlantic salmon from Lindloff; Atlantic salmon and speckled trout from Margaree and Middleton, and Atlantic salmon, Loch Leven trout, rainbow trout and speckled trout from Yarmouth. Atlantic salmon were distributed from all the New Brunswick plants, as well as trout.

Threw Children To Death And Leaped After

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Oct. 17.—Thrown from a window on the sixteenth floor of a downtown hotel by their aunt, two small children met death in the street, while hundreds of workers and shoppers were on their way home. The woman responsible for their deaths, Mrs. Aurelia Lorenz, 31-year-old divorcee and former wife of a wealthy Milwaukee contractor, then ended her own life by leaping after them. She left a note, blaming mistreatment by her brother, Rudolph Libo, for her act. Her victims were: Vivian and Milton Libo, aged 5 and 4, respectively. Authorities investigating the tragedy which occurred late yesterday, were holding Libo for further questioning. They also questioned his wife, the mother of the children, but subsequently permitted her to return to her home. 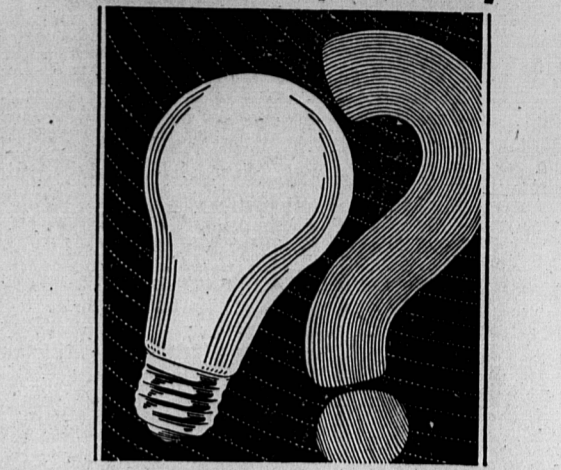

Grid Iron Fans Revive Debate On Amateurism

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—(By The Canadian Press)—Absorbed in a debate over whether or not the revised United States football code really an improvement over the 1931 set grid-iron fans were hardly prepared for the slashing criticism of the game which has broken out again even more violent than last year. Gardens To Give Place to Business

LONDON, Oct. 17.—(By The Canadian Press)—The pick of the housebreaker is falling in Carlton Gardens. One of the most exclusive residential quarters for a couple of centuries or more, this little area just off Pall Mall has striven gallantly to "keep up appearances." But all in vain. Carlton Gardens and Carlton House Terrace seem likely to suffer such a dissolution as has befallen Grosvenor Gardens and half a score of other streets and squares of the West End where the "eligible family residence" has been converted into a block of offices.

Demolition has begun upon no. four in the Gardens, in which Prime Minister Palmerston ("Pam") lived, and which much later became the townhouse of Lord Balfour. Carlton Gardens also housed Gladstone, Kitchener and Curzon. Gladstone was never a wealthy man, according to the standards of his time, and he found it impossible to remain at No. 11, for he was living above his means, and none of his neighbors had less than \$100,000 a year.

Many Original Manuscripts Shown

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—(By The Canadian Press)—A centenary exhibition of the works of Sir Walter Scott has been opened here at Columbia University. Said to be the largest and most complete of those now being held in all English speaking countries the exhibition contains manuscripts, first editions, and original material relating to the author's life, gathered from nearly every collection of note in the United States. Nearly 100 exhibits are shown. Among these are part of the original manuscript of "Waverley." The original copy of a letter from Sir Walter to Joan Murray, editor of the Edinburgh Review, relating to the authorship of Waverley, a novel published anonymously in 1814 and not acknowledged by the author until 1827, when the pressure of debts forced him to write frankly for money is also shown.

"If you are not the author of Waverley," Murray had written, "will you do me the favor to review 'The Tales of My Landlord' for the quarterly?" Scott's reply was: "You have no right to question me on the subject of Waverley. What you want is the review of 'The Tales of My Landlord' and here it is."
