Uncle Sam sees Plenty thrills As sport fades

NEW YORK, Dec. 28 (AP)—War threatens to dim temporarily the spotlight on the United States sports stage, but it does, 1941 has given the fans a thrill-packed curtain scene.

Louis regains Ring Magazine's Boxing crown

NEW YORK, Dec. 28 (AP)—After losing the honor a year ago, Joe Louis today was named "the fighter of the year" by Ring Magazine's annual poll of fistic experts all over the world.

By a 5 to 2 margin, a total of 202 observers of the sport, located in Canada, Britain, the United States, Cuba, Panama, Hawaii and Australia, wrapped up the honor and handed it to the Brown Bomber for 1941 for the fourth time in six years.

The "fighter of the year" is announced in a copyright article in the Ring's February issue in which editor Nat Fleischer and his board of experts also decided that Billy Conn, winner of the 1940 award, is Louis' outstanding heavyweight championship challenger.
