ACCEPTS CALL.—Rev. Neil McLaughlin, B. A., of Fredericton, N. B., a brother of Mr. John McLaughlin, has accepted an invitation to Hamilton, Bermuda, for the next pastoral term, to succeed the present able preacher, Rev. D. B. Hemmeon, B. A.

SATISFACTORY MILL.—The steam saw mill at Mount Stewart, which has been running for the past year under the management of Mr. Russell Clark is doing good work. This mill which has been running for the past six years, was built and owned by Mr. Bruce Jay of Mount Stewart, operated it up till within a year, with enviable success. He then sold it to the present owner and moved out west. Mr. Clark has been running the mill since with good success. There is attached to the sawmill a grain crushing mill which comes in conveniently for farmers.—S.

WOOLEN MILL PROPOSITION.—A definite proposal is now before the people of Charlottetown with regard to the establishment in this city of a mill for the manufacture of knitted woolen underwear. At the back of the project are two well-known Islanders, Messrs. S. E. Reid and G. Clarke, who have both had considerable experience of the clothing manufacturing business. The proposal which is being made and which has already interested a number of the business men of the city is to form a company to carry on the manufacture of unshrinkable underwear, sweaters, etc., in Charlottetown. It is estimated that to acquire or erect suitable buildings and to install the best and latest machinery for the manufacture of this kind of clothing, the plant to be capable of turning out 25 dozen high-class garments daily, and necessitating the employment of over thirty employees, the cost would be about \$35,000. To turn out the number of garments stated, it is calculated that about 120,000 lbs. of wool, which will be procured in this Island, will be used annually. In addition to the \$35,000 that the plant is estimated to cost, about \$15,000 is required for working capital, so that it is proposed that the company should be formed with a capital of \$50,000. As regards returns excellent prospects are held out to investors, annual profits of over thirty per cent. being assured. Besides that, the proposal has in its favor the fact that it would be giving employment to a number of local people and will be using home-raised wool, and that as regards the supply of raw material and labor, every facility is at hand. The wool manufacturing factories at present in operation are said to be unable to cope with the ever-increasing demand for unshrinkable underwear, and it is stated that there would be a ready sale for all the goods that the proposed business could manufacture.

ILL WITH SLOW FEVER.—Mr. G. D. Wright's ambulance was out yesterday afternoon to remove Mr. William Rowe, of Messrs. McDonald & Rowe, to the P. E. Island Hospital. Mr. Rowe is ill with slow fever and last night was reported to be about the same as when he entered the Hospital, except that his temperature was a little lower.

NEW ACCOUNTING SYSTEM.—Mr. F. L. Schwartz, Travelling Auditor of the I. C. R., is at present on the Island. He is visiting the different railway stations and instructing the agents in the new system of accounting. On Wednesday he visited the stations on the western line, returning to the city Thursday after visiting the stations on the Cape Traverse branch. Yesterday he called on the agents of the Murray Harbor branch.

NEW FERRY SERVICE.—The Government proposes to establish a steam ferry service across the Cardigan river. Tenders are now being called for by the Public Works Department (Canada) for the reconstruction and extension of the wharf on the Georgetown side of the river, which is a necessary work to be undertaken in the establishment of the new service. These tenders are to be sent in by October 7. There is a ferry service across the Cardigan river at present, but it is purely for passengers and is maintained by a small gasoline boat. The intention now is to conduct a service similar to that across the Charlottetown harbor, and to put on a large steam boat for the transportation of horses and wagons. This is a public work that the people of that district have been asking for in vain for almost a generation, and it is hoped now that it is to be done that it will be completed and the new service started early next year.

RETURNING HOME.—The western train to Summerside and the Pictou boat was crowded this morning with delegates, who have been attending the Missionary Convention and were returning to their homes.

SCHOONER HARRY REFLAGGED.—After being submerged for almost a week at Owl's Head, N. S., and given up to the sea, the schooner Harry, which was purchased last spring from Capt. McKinnon, of North Sydney, by Mr. A. A. Macdonald, of Cardigan, P. E. I., was raised and towed to Halifax Friday by Brister's wrecking steamer Brigewater. The salvaging of this schooner is a record piece of work reflecting great credit on Captain Larder and his crew. Last Wednesday the Harry was sold by the underwriters at private sale. C. Brister and Son, Ltd., purchased the hulk as it lay on the shore. The Harry it will be remembered was reported to have struck a derelict last Friday evening, while running down the coast loaded with salt from Summerside, P. E. I. To save her from sinking and for the safety of the crew she was heached.

GAISPE OIL FIELDS FOR BRITISH NAVY.

LONDON, Sept. 11.—In view of the increasing attention which is being directed to the adoption of oil as fuel in the British Navy, it is interesting to know that oil lands in different parts of the Empire are being sedulously developed.

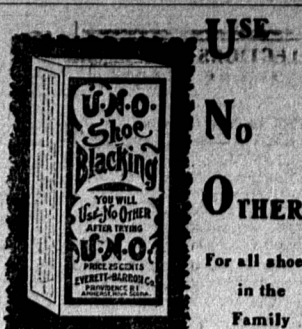
The decision of the Government to secure supplies as far as possible within the Empire has given a new impetus to the search for large oil deposits in different parts of the dominions, and it would be fitting that the premier dominion, Canada should be reckoned among the fuel-oil sources of supply.

In this connection Viscount Selby, who is chairman of the Eastern Canada Company, and who has just returned from the Canadian fields, supplies interesting details. In the course of a conversation Lord Selby remarked that he was greatly impressed with what he saw and heard during the visit. The most favorably situated oil field in Canada, from a geographical and strategical point of view, he states, are those of Gaspe, which extend from the seacoast on the Bay of Gaspe, on the Gulf of St. Lawrence, for several miles in a north-westerly direction.

It was in the Laroque district, in the Northwest, that a considerable number of wells were put down, and good supplies of oil of high quality obtained. What is known as the anticlinal formation extends from this district in a south and easterly direction down the coast.

The opinions of experienced drilling men and geologists in that country are to the effect that oil will be found there in large quantities. Should this be the case, the importance of the field from the points of view of supply for the British navy and for marine and industrial purposes cannot be overestimated.

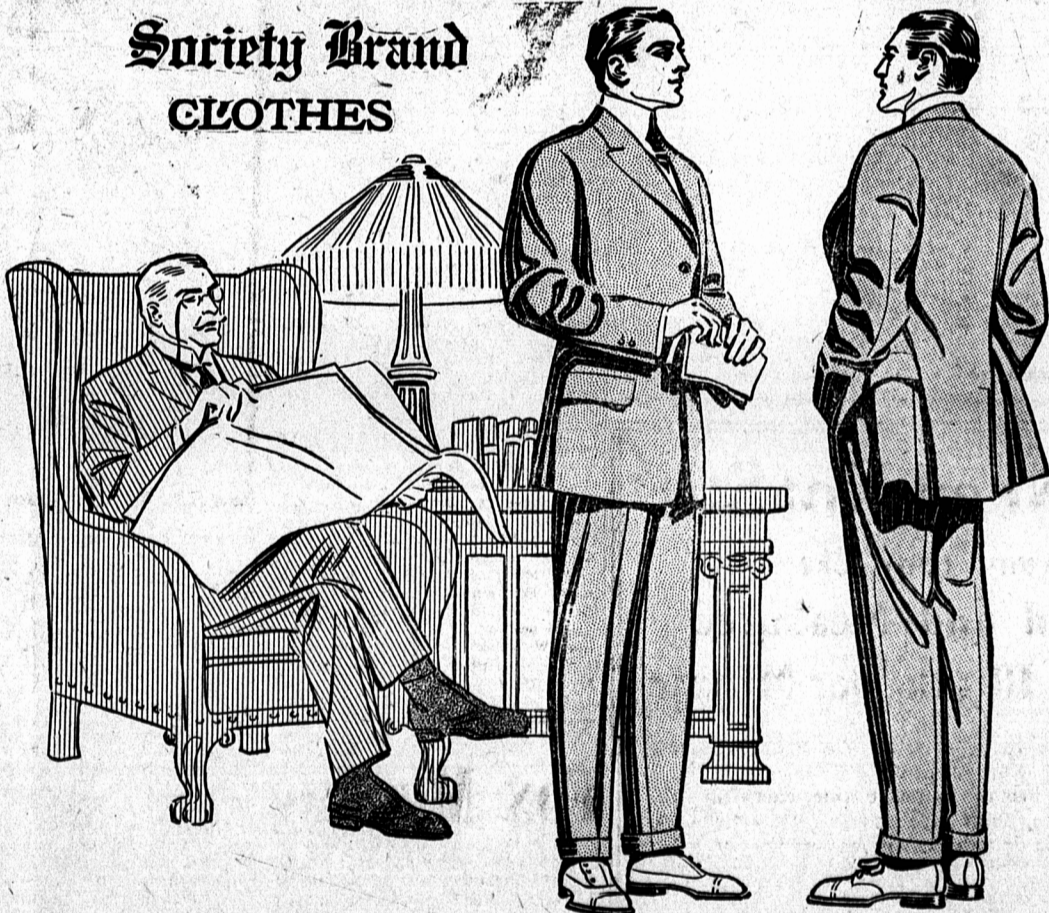
