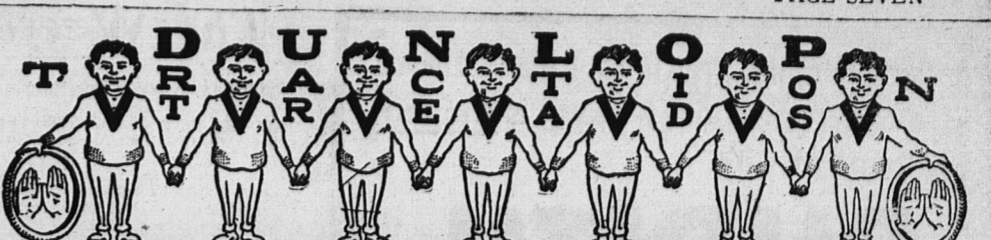

**PARIS HOTEL MAN A GERMAN SPY.**

PARIS, July 23.—Astonishing disclosures the expected at the approaching trial of Arthur Geissler who has been jailed here on a charge of embezzling \$100,000 belonging to the shareholders of hotels in which he is interested.

Geissler was the biggest hotel man in Paris. In addition to the Astoria, which was patronized by all the leading American visitors, he ran the Campbell, Malsherbes, Beausite, Columbia and D'Auriche hotels in Paris, the exclusive Roches Noires at Trouville, and the fashionable Imperial office.

What astonished Paris business men in the fact that ten or twelve years ago Geissler was penniless. They allege that at least ten years ago the German Secret Service, the most efficient organization of its kind in the world, began to finance him with a view to enabling him to corner the best hotels in Paris.

They further allege that it was on the Kaiser's own orders that Geissler built the sumptuous Astoria in readiness for the Kaiser's triumphant entry into Paris as conqueror. The staff of the hotel was exclusively German with the exception of the chefs.

These allegations constitute a charge that Geissler acted as secret agent on behalf of Germany before and during the war. In fairness to him therefore, it must be added that no publicity has been given to his recree ertaoc btohhhdho mm mm mply. He is not indeed officially charged with espionage.

At the outbreak of the war he was arrested on suspicion of having erected a wireless apparatus on the roof of Astoria—which occupies a commanding position at the top of the Avenue des Champs Elysees—with the object of intercepting official messages sent to and from the Eiffel Tower, but the charge failed and he was lodged in a segregation camp as an enemy alien.

His hotels were sequestered and while verifying the books the government auditors discovered they had been tampered with. Geissler was thereupon arrested and transferred to a Paris jail.

Incidents in his career are cited as showing that he was in close touch with the inner circle in Berlin, headed by the Kaiser which rules the destinies of the central empire.

Geissler was persona grata at the German Embassy, and even attended official receptions. At his hotel he staffed with German, except the kitchen, and whenever complaints were made, it is said Geissler refused to dispense with the erring servant. This

**PROBATE HOUSES FOR THE REFUGEES.**

TORONTO, July 23.—A New York special to the Toronto Globe says: "Negotiations likely to be concluded within the next few days will probably bring to Brooklyn the most unusual as well as one of the biggest of the war orders. A contract for the construction of 20,000 portable houses, to be used in Belgium and Northern France, is involved and aggregates many millions of dollars as the purchasing agent thus far in the transaction.

The plan calls for the furnishing of structures suitable for dwellings, churches, schools and business buildings. Entire cities and towns are to be created to house the refugees made homeless by the high tide of the German advance in France. Shipment of the buildings is expected to be completed by winter.

It is believed that Great Britain, France and Belgium are acting jointly.

**MONTREAL MAY SEE AIRSHIPS IN BATTLE.**

MONTREAL, July 23.—Whatever their mission may be peaceful or otherwise, strange aircraft visiting the vicinity at nightfall in the days to come will in all probability meet with a warm reception, for there are now one of two aeroplanes in Montreal which are ready to take the air and pursue the visitors.

For the past week or so, nightly reports of aircraft in the vicinity of Montreal have been received, and should the intrepid birdmen, for there are at times two of the machines, again fly in this direction, the citizens of Montreal or the environs will probably be treated to the thrilling sight of a duel in the air, or at least a chase.

The machines in the city, it is stated, are being kept in readiness to fly at a moment's notice, and will give the intruder a warm reception on his next appearance, should his intentions prove hostile.

**WEAPON WHICH ONTARIO GOVERNMENT WILL SUPPLY TO THE FORCES**

MONTREAL July 25.—The machine guns which the Ontario Government will supply to the Canadian forces at the front at a cost of \$200,000, the official name of the weapon is "The Lewis Automatic Machine Gun," but it weighs only 25 pounds without its tripod support, which is four and a half pounds in weight. Thus the whole gun may be carried about by one man, and operated by another, without difficulty.

A powerful man may even use the weapon from the shoulder, as though it were an ordinary rifle.

The gun can fire 440 rounds a minute, including the time necessary to change magazines, each of which contains 47 rounds. It is in operation in the French and Belgian trenches at the present time, and is somewhat similar to a Hotchkiss automatic rifle employed by the French.

The Lewis gun is designed in such a manner that the only tool necessary to dismantle it completely is an ordinary screw driver. At the point of whose bullet is used to disconnect every portion of the mechanism; and this operation is such a simple matter that the gun can be dismantled, and any small damaged part replaced, well inside five minutes. The weapon after the service ammunition, and its range is similar to that of service rifles. When used on a fixed mount the butt stock may be removed and a "spade handle" substituted.

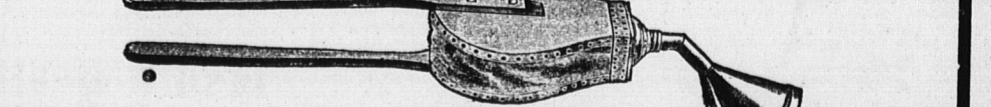
