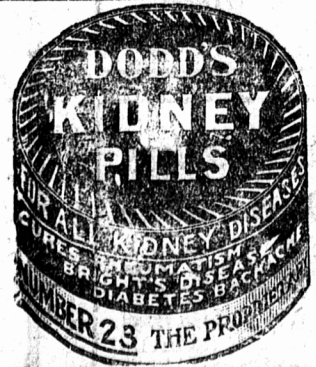
THE GOLDEN ORGAN

BRYAN AND WILSON IN A SECRET MEETING.

TRENTON, N. J., Dec. 21.—A conference that is expected to have a marked effect on the conduct of the next administration of the national government took place here today between Woodrow Wilson, President-elect, and William Jennings Bryan, at the State House.

Mr. Bryan, the man who had more to do in securing the nomination of Mr. Wilson than any other man, arrived early. Governor Wilson left Princeton earlier than usual in left-adjutant-General Sadler's big touring car to keep the appointment.

Mr. Bryan arrived at the State House at 9:30 o'clock. Governor Wilson was in a side room with his stenographer when Mr. Bryan was ushered in by Secretary Family, who had met him when he stepped off the train at the Trenton Station at 9:15.

COLUMBIA, Mo., Dec. 23.—Following the report to the police that he found the bodies of Mrs. George Moore, his mother, and Mrs. Mary J. Wilson, his grandmother, crushed with an axe when he entered their home near here, Lee Moore was arrested on a charge of murder.

Moore denies he knew anything of the murder until he found the bodies. He said he came from Moberly to arrange a Christmas celebration for the women. He said he arrived early in the morning, but the police allege he came here yesterday and registered at a hotel under an assumed name.

A search of the room where Moore is alleged to have stayed last night, the police say, revealed stains on some of the clothing which they say Moore wore. The police supply no motive for the crime except the suspicion of robbery.

Moore showed no emotion.

MORPHINE HABIT INCREASES IN PARIS.

PARIS, Dec. 23.—A general investigation into the illicit sale of morphine in Paris will be made as a result of the death here yesterday from the use of the drug of Rene Bichet, a young man who recently was appointed professor of French in the Royal College at Budapest. The authorities are convinced that an aggressive campaign must be waged in order to combat the growing craving for morphine in Paris.

The vice is said to be at its worst among young women frequenters of the night cafe and dance halls in the Mont Martre district and in collegiate circles in the Latin Quarter. The police are in possession of astounding statistics relating to the spread of the morphine habit. The newspapers claim that the craze for the drug has reached terrible proportions in the higher normal colleges.

THE LARGEST RELIGIOUS MISSION IN THE WORLD.

The Manchester Central Hall was one of the earliest experiments in the conversion of an old chapel, which had survived its original purpose, into the centre of a modern city mission, combining with the usual religious services a network of agencies for the treatment of social problems.

Under Mr. Collier's guidance it has developed into the largest religious mission in the world. Its methods have been copied all over England and in many parts of the colonies and America, and representatives of religious and social agencies are constantly going to Manchester to study its organization and results.

Mr. Collier has been the pioneer of this sort of work among the Free Churches and although, being the first in the field, his enterprises were necessarily experimental, they have all been astonishingly successful.

THE STOCK POT.

All left over meats and bones in fresh condition can be used for the stock-pot. The bones from roast meat and the giblets included not only the gizzard and heart of the fowl but the neck and wing pinions and the heart and feet. The heads must be skinned carefully washed and bills and eyes cut for ten minutes after which the skin can easily be removed. But also cook them in salt and water to remove the baryard odor before putting them on to cook. Chicken and and turkey feet are gelatinous and add a good deal to the quality of soup stock. The feet and head of ducks and geese however are not good for the soup stock. After collecting all the material that can be had weigh it and add a quart of water to each pound putting in two or three carrons one medium sized onion several celery stalks and a few sprigs of parsley and salt and pepper. Cook slowly until the meat falls to rags skimming off grease carefully for if allowed to remain this will give the stock a rank taste. Strain while hot and when cold cover the vessel and put away in a cool place.

HANGERS FOR DRESS WAISTS.

Dress waists very quickly lose their shape and freshness unless they are properly taken care of. A good idea for hanging up dress waists, where one has plenty of closet room, and more closet room than drawer accommodation, is to take the cheap wire or wooden frame, that can be bought for a few cents, and cover it with inexpensive ribbon. This ribbon must be just wide enough to cover when around the frame.

Line the ribbon with a layer of cotton batting, not quite so wide, and sprinkle with your favorite sachet powder. Then sew the ribbon over the frame, letting the seam come in and least conspicuous place. The ribbon will retain the odor for a long time and impart a delicate perfume to the waists hung upon them, while the frames hold the waists in much better shape than if they were hung upon two hooks.

A careful woman who always hangs her waists upon frames declares that it is the only true method of keeping them in perfect order and condition.
