A RARE treat is in store for those who attend the concert to be held next Thursday evening, in the basement of the First Methodist Church. The program will appear in a few days. Look out for it.

THE Janitor's Benefit given by the Managers of the Hillsboro Rink last night was largely attended both by skaters and promoters. The ice was in good condition and the inspiring music of Prof. Vinnicombe's orchestra were greatly enjoyed.

THE mail special was delayed about an hour last night to effect connections with the train from the west. Under the present arrangement the mails from sections west of Summerside are being forwarded one day in advance of previous arrangements.

Mrs. W. W. Moore and child who have been spending some months in the city left last night to join her husband. It will be remembered that Mr. Moore went to South Africa after the war broke out in charge of a cargo of hay. During his absence Mrs. Moore came to the city and resided with her mother, Mrs. C. V. McGregor.

A special train will leave Charlottetown to-day for Mt. Stewart at 1.30 p. m. (local) sharp, returning about 6 p. m. (local). The train is run in order to convey those wishing to attend the political meeting to be held at Mt. Stewart at 2 o'clock this afternoon. The meeting will be addressed by Sir Louis H. Davies, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Hon. D. A. McKinnon and others. All desiring to attend are asked to remember the hour of departure of train.

At 7.30 yesterday evening enquiry was made at the Police Station for a missing team. It appears that after coming to the City the owner tied the animal to a post and went calling. Forgetfulness overcame him and when the shades of evening began to fall he thought of his horse. Arriving on the Market Square he found that his mode of conveyance had departed, hence his anxious moments. It is supposed that the animal, more thoughtful than his master, had started for his home.

THE western section of the P. E. Island Railway is being opened up as fast as possible. The train which left Summerside on Tuesday morning to clear the snow after Monday's storm is now about one half mile west of Piusville. Trackmaster Houle thinks it will take nearly all day to-day to get to Elmsdale—about three miles distant. The cuttings ahead of this train are full of snow with 18 inches of crust on top that has to be removed with picks and spades; ordinary shovels are of no use until the crust is taken off. A large number of men are at work on the section in advance of the train between Piusville and Tignish. The approaches to the cuttings where the snow is about a foot deep is being removed with picks. The engine and snow plough which became derailed on Thursday evening on Cape Traverse Branch was placed on the track at 3 a. m. yesterday and brought to the city together with the engine and plough derailed near Hovlan on Wednesday evening. Owing to the coupling gear of each engine being broken, the order of procession was as follows: One engine two cars, with wrecking apparatus, snow plough, and wreck engine with tender ahead. Men engaged on the railway state that the make-up of the train was entirely original.

THE Halifax Chronicle says:—Trainer Mack, whom the Wanderers have decided to re-engage, is at present in Iowa, and will be in Halifax early in June. It will be remembered that Mr. Mack visited Charlottetown with Messrs. Stephen and Ruggles last summer the latter two taking part in the sports on the C. A. A. grounds.

THE concert Thursday evening in the New Perth Hall was very largely attended. A lengthy program was rendered, Mr. J. A. Dewar occupying the chair. The program consisted largely of singing, readings recitations, dialogues and music by the Montague band. Pies were auctioned by Messrs. Wellington McLeod and J. A. Dewar. The handsome sum of \$53.00 was realized which goes towards finishing the hall.

THE Stanley Bridge Dairying Co. held its yearly meeting on Tuesday. The Secretary's report showed that the 180 patrons who supplied milk furnished 2,529,583 lbs, which manufactured 236,549 lbs. of cheese. The fat averaged 3.67 per 100 lbs making in total 143,302,945 lbs of butter fat and casein, which realized 21.9 cents per lb. The total receipts for the year were \$23,900.07 out of which \$21,061.46 was divided among the patrons for their milk, the difference in the above amounts being necessary for manufacturing expenses and milk drawing.

In regard to the missing man Francis Malone, Bonwell, the police have been informed that on March 1st he came to the city and made a deposit in the Bank of Nova Scotia of \$102 in gold. On March 8th he again came to the city, having on his person \$250 in money which he changed at one of the banks and received \$242 in American money. He desired that the other eight be Canadian currency. He then enquired if \$8 was sufficient to pay his expenses to Bangor. His son will telegraph to Bangor this morning for particulars.
