*SOURIS—NORTH SIDE NOTES—Good Friday being beautiful and fine with South-west wind felt good to the fishermen as is the opinion amongst them is that "as the winds and weather is on Good Friday so it will be for forty days."

Seldom were the North Side fishermen feeling so jubilant over the season's prospects. Farming conditions are not considered very much at all. Fishing is the thing. However, all the farmer-fishermen here secured hired men to put in their crops and from the generous wages they are offering must expect big returns from the crops next fall.

The general wage being paid by the fishermen to strong boys and young men is \$35, a month and in most cases, guarantee ten months work. They must compete with the lobster factories in both time and wages. The factories usually give two months work and pay for labor at the factory, about \$35 a month. Amongst those farmer-fishermen on the North Side who have already secured help are John Alex. McDonald, Priest Pond, Curwen Peter McInnis and Dan. Currie farmer, Peter McPhee has Anthony Longphie hired, McEachern Bros, Hermanville, have young Ellward, East Baltic, S. D. McIsaac has Cheverie, New Zealand, Alex McDonald, Big Bush has Bill Dunley for his farmer, Frank B. McDonald has young Conway, New Zealand. Alfred O'Hanly, Cable Head, has Angus McAdam hired for his farmer, Jno. A. Currie is hired with Wm. Regan, Priest Pond, while his neighbor, Mr. Deagle is to put in his crop. Michael C. McPhee Big Pond who is ill has secured a young man from the south side, J. D. McIsaac, Rockbarra, has James Brown, for farmer, this year again. The opening of the fishing season under such favorable circumstances has opened up an avenue of great activity and industry on the North Side this year. The only regrets are that operations were not allowed earlier by the Dept. at Ottawa.

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. J. J. BARRETT

The death occurred in the Charlottetown Hospital at an early hour yesterday morning of Angelina Gillis, beloved wife of Mr. J. J. Barrett of Glenroy, Mt. Stewart.

Mrs. Barrett, who was only thirty-four years of age, entered the Hospital just a week ago Monday for treatment, but despite every possible care and attention she steadily grew weaker until the end came.

She was a most estimable Christian woman, a daughter of the late Alan Gillis, of Mt. Stewart, and a niece of Rev. I. R. A. MacDonald of St. Teresa's.

Her death in the very bloom of womanhood will be deplored by a wide circle of friends.

She leaves to mourn, besides a sorrowing husband, two young children, also four sisters, Josephine, wife of Mr. W. A. Bolding, of San Francisco, Lenora, wife of Mr. Fred Fisher of Boston, and Miss Theresa Gillis of Boston and Miss Margaret Gillis of Calgary, Miss Theresa is expected home this evening.

The remains left Mr. A. A. Hennessey's Funeral Home yesterday afternoon and were taken by train to Mt. Stewart. The funeral will probably be held on Wednesday morning to St. Andrew's Church and thence to the Roman Catholic Cemetery adjoining.

MRS. J. LESTER DOUGLAS

The death occurred in the Prince Edward Island Hospital at one o'clock Monday morning, under unusually sad circumstances, of Mary Balderston, beloved wife of Mr. J. Lester Douglas.

Mrs. Douglas entered the hospital four weeks ago, and on Wednesday last April 8th, gave birth to a son.

She was doing well up to within a day or two ago, when she became critically ill, and although she made a gallant fight against the inevitable, she rapidly sank until her spirit passed to God who gave it.

Mrs. Douglas was in the very prime of life, having been born at Melville, on April 16th, 1881, so that she had scarcely reached her 44th year. She was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Balderston.

Before her marriage she had been residing for a number of years in Charlottetown where she and her sister, the late Miss Margaret Balderston had conducted the Strathcona Hotel.

After Miss Balderston's death in January, 1924, Mrs. Douglas resumed the operation of the hotel, being associated with her sister, Mrs. Nicholson and the latter's daughter, until the business was taken over

by Mr. and Mrs. Albert Simpson about a year ago.

The late Mrs. Douglas was a most estimable woman, possessing admirable qualities of mind and heart. She had a lovable and attractive personality, and was a general favorite.

She has been called away when in the natural course of events there were many years of usefulness before her, as she always looked the picture of health and vigor. There will be great sympathy extended to the bereaved husband who left alone with his infant son, for whom his mother made the supreme sacrifice, in today under the cloud of a great sorrow as he mourns one who has been his devoted wife for over six years.

There are also left to mourn one sister, Mrs. Samuel Nicholson, of Belle River (who has recently been under treatment in the Prince Edward Island Hospital) and two brothers, Benjamin, in Melville, and J. W. of the Mechanical Department of the Salt Lake Railway, Los Angeles, Calif.

The funeral takes place today, (Tuesday). The services, starting at 2.45 p.m., will be conducted by Rev. W. Orr Mulligan and Rev. W. M. Ryan. Burial will be in the People's Cemetery.

Spent Moderately

For Funeral Of President Ebert

LONDON, April 12.—Press comments on the funeral cost of Germany's first president, Friedrich Ebert, which amounted to approximately \$50,000, have recalled the fact that England's most expensive funeral was that of the Duke of Wellington, which cost the nation \$500,000.

According to the estimates in London the expense of President Ebert's burial was very moderate compared with the cost of the obsequies for old Emperor William in 1888, when the city of Berlin spent \$430,000 and the Imperial treasury more than \$550,000 in addition. The funeral expenses of King Edward were about \$200,000 those of Queen Victoria \$175,000.
