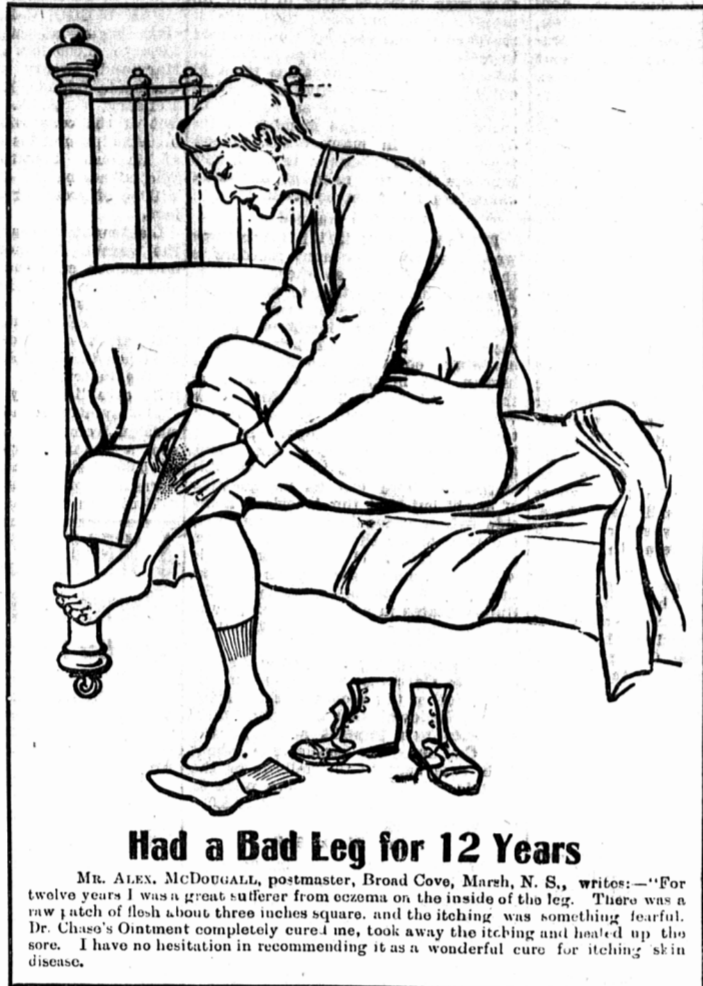

## ENGLISH PEACE DELEGATES MISSION MEETS OPPOSITION

LONDON, May 3 (Special)—The British delegation now on its way to the United States for the celebration of the Anglo-American peace centenary may encounter some hostile demonstrations. Certain leaders of the extreme Irish and labor movements are advising their American friends to express opposition to the British mission. Suffragette leaders are appealing to American women to denounce any friendly dealings between the two countries until England gives the vote to women.

The opponents of the peace mission predict that its public appearance will provoke outbreaks such as occurred at the peace meeting at Carnegie Hall in December. In support of the ratification of the arbitration treaties pending between the United States, Great Britain and France.

Because Lord Weardale and other members of the delegation are connected with the Carnegie peace foundation and laborites call it "the Carnegie mission."

The English labor unions will hold meetings, as is their custom, in Hyde Park tomorrow. Representatives of the German unions will parade with them for the first time, and both English and German speakers intend to denounce "the Carnegie mission."

Their ground is that the mission is designed to foster an Anglo-American alliance and alienate American sympathies from Germany, whereas, they argue, workers of all nationalities should stand together for their own interests.

Mr. Benjamin Tillett, secretary of the Dock, Wharf, Riverside and General Workers' Union of Great Britain and Ireland, will send a cablegram to Mr. Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, asking him to oppose the British delegation.

"General" Mrs. Flora Drummond, one of the leaders of the militant suffragettes who was arrested yesterday, succeeded tonight in smuggling out of the jail to a friend a message for the American suffragettes. This message, which later was cabled to the Women's Suffrage Union of New York, was as follows:—"Carnegie's so-called peace delegates are nearing your shores. None

of them has raised a voice against the torture of women in English prisons. The tory members of Parliament among them were their setas on a sink-the-German-navy policy. They have all voted against home rule, suffragettes, Irishmen and Germans, the border that they must draw these war provokers!"

Miss Scott-Troy, the San Francisco suffragette, sent a cablegram to Senator O'Gorman at Washington, saying:—"If the Senate will investigate Carnegie's peace fund they may find an olive branch wrapped around a sword. We hope that the Senate will not attend the functions given in honor of the peace delegates, who dictate to Americans that they must rewrite their history, to save English feelings and sully the fair name of George Washington."

## DIAZ SWEARS HE WILL KEEP PACT

MEXICO CITY, via Galveston, May 3 (Special)—"Never will I raise arms against the present government or violate any of the conditions of my pact with Huerta," said Felix Diaz, denying Huerta the press reports from the border that Diaz envoys, who were captured by Carranza, had stated that they had been authorized by Diaz to propose to Carranza a union with Diaz to overthrow Huerta.

At the monthly election of the Chamber of Deputies the Diaz supporters elected a full slate. The result is the encouragement of his followers in the belief that Congress will pass an election law and call a special Presidential election at an early date.

The rumor is persistent that Huerta is disinterested with his present Cabinet and that no appointment of a Minister of the Interior to succeed Garcia Granados will be made until practically a complete reorganization of the Cabinet has been arranged by himself and Diaz.

## SWORD REMAINS FINAL ARBITER

BERLIN, May 3 (Special)—Crown Prince Frederick William, in writing the preface to a book "Germany in Arms," of which he is reputed to be the author, exhibits himself, the future German Emperor, as an unbeliever in the possibility of ever abolishing war. He declares that diplomacy may delay and occasionally avert conflicts, but "the sword will remain the final and decisive factor until the world's end."

In another passage he says:—"Only with the support of our good sword can we maintain that place in the sun, which is due to us, but which is not willingly accorded to us."

The author points out Germany's unfortunate geographical position and warns his countrymen that the German army and navy must be kept continually at the highest point of efficiency. He says that increasing commercialism and the desire for riches threaten to destroy the old ideals, "since for the undisturbed earning of money one needs peace at any price. History shows that the nations in which commercial interests have decided their policy have ended ingloriously."

He appeals to all Germans to be ready to sacrifice their blood and their possessions and continues:—"Then the world may be full of devils arrayed in arms against us, but we shall conquer."

## TWO PERISHED: SEVERAL HURT IN FIRE AT N. Y.

OTSEWAGA, N. Y., May 1—Two men were burned to death early today and three badly injured in a fire which partly destroyed the Healy House, a three story structure of brick and wood.

## RESCUE PRISONER FROM WARSHIP

Portuguese Revolutionaries Board Cruiser and Release Disturbers.

LISBON, May 3 (Special)—Revolutionaries by a daring scheme, have obtained the release of a number of prisoners arrested during Sunday's political disturbances in the capital and confined on board the Portuguese cruiser, Republica in the harbor.

Several boats filled with armed men dressed as sailors clambered on board the cruiser at two o'clock in the morning and demanded that the prisoners be handed over to them. At the same moment three shots were fired from the guns on the cruiser, for what reason has not been disclosed.

The prisoners were then given up by their guards to the men who had boarded the warship, and it appeared as if the affair had been carried out

with the connivance of some of the officers and crew. The boarders and the rescued prisoners then departed and landed before the naval authorities in the harbor understood what was going on and they had disappeared before any action could be taken against them.
