"THE FLAG IS THERE TO STAY."

One Mr. Saville of Dundas, has written a letter to the Semi-Weekly Watchman of this city contending that Britain should have submitted to arbitration her differences with the Transvaal. Mr. Saville also challenges the editor of the GUARDIAN to a public debate on the question. In our opinion he has been quite sufficiently answered by the editor of the Watchman in an article which has the right ring. We quote a paragraph or two: It is all very well to advocate arbitration, but it should not be forgotten that it was not Great Britain that first declared war or unsheathed the sword. It is fresh in the memory of all that while Great Britain was remonstrating with the Transvaal republic (so-called) in regard to certain grievances, a peremptory demand came from Kruger to her to withdraw her military forces from her territory in Africa, and recall any additional troops which she purposed sending out there. Considering the position occupied by Great Britain in that country, and among the nations of the earth, we consider this the most stupendous piece of presumption that Kruger could be guilty of, and if Great Britain had not resented it as she is doing it would have been a fatal blow to her power and prestige in all parts of the world. Such a demand could not be entertained for an instant and even if it inflicted loss of life and treasure it was an insult which no self-respecting nation, much less the foremost nation on the earth, could brook. Briefly stated, the question at issue is, shall the British flag be lowered in South Africa and the Boer or Dutch colors raised in its place? We think not. The British flag is there to stay.

Among those who volunteered in Manitoba and were most desirous to go to South Africa and fight for the British flag were a number of Galicians.

There are a number of Islanders resident in Brockton, Mass., one of whom has sent us a marked copy of the Gazette of that town, dealing with the question of liquor license. It shows that in twelve months under license there were 1,627 arrests while in a like period under no-license there were only 468 arrests. It was ever thus.

We do not hear much of Hon. Edward Blake these days, but he spoke a good word to his constituents in Longford the other day when he told them that if the Fenians should again attempt the invasion of this country he would borrow a rifle and take passage for Canada. The old Liberal leader has evidently lost nothing of his sterling loyalty while fighting the battle of Home Rule in Ireland.

After many trials it is said the Marconi system of wireless telegraphy has proved far less useful in conveying messages from point to point than the ancient heliograph. The atmosphere is clear for the most part of the time in South Africa, and a sun-flash reflected from a mirror can be seen a long distance through a field glass. Long and short flashes take the place of dashes and dots of the Morse telegraph code, and when the sun is shining a heliograph message can be transmitted about as rapidly as a telegraph despatch. Of course the heliograph is of no use by night, or on cloudy days, as it requires sunshine. The appliances for heliographing are simple and easily portable.

Longest Year on Record.

The year 47 B. C. was the longest year on record. By order of Julius Caesar it contained 445 days. The additional days were put in to make the seasons conform as nearly as possible with the solar year.

Church and Clergy.

The Volunteers of America are in touch with 10,500 men in prisons.

The translation of the New Testament into the Korean language has been completed.

The first Russian orthodox church in America is to be erected in New York at a cost of \$86,000.

Of the 84,000,000 people in South America it is estimated that 30,000,000 have never seen a Bible.

The London Mail speaks of Mr. Moody as "the great link between the churches of England and America."

The Methodists of Greater New York have decided to raise \$700,000 to clear the indebtedness of all the Methodist churches there.

President Kruger said to the Rev. Dr. Clark of the Endeavor society, when he visited him in Africa: "I am glad to have any one come to this country who loves the Lord Jesus Christ."

The Bishops of the Church of England will meet in London the last week of this month to discuss the desirability of a day of fasting and humiliation, the questions of a religious census, the episcopal veto, and the next convocation. A secret conclave will be held on Jan. 16 and 17.

The Rev. A. M. Bannatyne, a Presbyterian clergyman prominent in Scotland, who died recently, to the end of his days opposed resolutely the singing in church, not of hymns, but even paraphrases of the Psalms appended in the Scotch Bible. He would allow no organ in his church.

Edits Greenland Newspaper.

Paris, Jan. 16.—Among the skaters on the lake of the Club de Bois de Boulogne a tall figure, clad in fur cap and reindeer coat, is attracting attention by his superb skill as a skater. He is Herr L. Moller, editor and publisher of the Katorikmik, a paper printed in the little town of Godthaal, Greenland.

The Katorikmik is a monthly periodical, and consists of three columns of matter. It is written in the Eskimo tongue, and is composed, printed, and distributed by the editor in person. The terms of subscription are: Two elder ducks for a quarter and a seal for a year while single copies cost a dab chick—a common sea bird up in that region, and one delicious to eat.

The enterprise has paid Herr Moller well, and, for a Greenland, he is wealthy.
