THE LATEST TROUBLE IN CENTRAL AMERICA.

Nicaragua, where one of the periodical revolutions of Central America is now in progress, is an independent republic with half a million people and a territorial area about equal to that of the Maritime Provinces of Canada. General Zelaya, a man of 57 years, has been President since 1893. One General Estrada is leading a revolt there which has from the outset had many American sympathisers and which has been supplied with arms, ammunition and some recruits of adventurous spirits from the United States. Two of these latter, Leroy Cannon and Leonard Grace, were captured by President Zelaya's forces, court-martialed and shot. There is grave doubt in the United States as to whether these proceedings were regular. Against the dead men it is charged that they were dynamiting transports and mines, but the mere fact of such a charge being made affords no evidence of its truth. Some American warships have been sent to investigate, and incidentally their presence will give some moral support to the revolutionary forces, which are reported as having blockaded Greytown, a principal port of Nicaragua, which has a population of two thousand. The outcome seems likely to be that the Washington Government will recognise the rebels under General Estrada as lawful belligerents. This will enable them to buy arms and

GRAIN MOVEMENT IS VERY HEAVY.

OTTAWA, Nov. 23.—Inspection returns show that the grain movement from the West has been far ahead of last year. The trade and commerce department reports inspection of 51,246,350 bushels at Winnipeg to Nov. 7, and of this 40,516,350 was wheat. To the same date lake port shipments amounted to 29,806,999. This is about 10,000,000 bushels ahead of last year.

A FATAL FIRE IN BROOKLYN, N. Y.

NEW YORK, Nov. 24.—Five persons were burned to death in a tenement house fire in Brooklyn early this morning. The building was occupied by eleven families. Besides the dead, eight Italians were seriously burned.

MR. FIELDING TALKS BETTER ABOUT THE TUNNEL.

We are glad to find the Tunnel again being spoken of in favorable terms in Parliament. Last year it got a black eye in the handling there. Now we have the full quartette of Island members speaking favorable words and Hon Mr Fielding endorsing the work as important and necessary. The St John Standard gives the fullest outline of the Finance Minister's remarks that has so far reached us and we quote it here:

Mr. Fielding said that in earlier days the Tunnel had been regarded as impracticable and visionary, but the progress of engineering science had brought into the realm of practical affairs many things formerly held to be impossible. He was inclined to think that this was one of them. He dissented from Mr. Fraser's view that the obligation was anything more than their desire to see Prince Edward

Island share in the good things of the present growing time. If an inquiry would show that it could be got at a moderate cost, he would be inclined to take the project up vigorously and seriously.

The Standard is an Opposition journal, and it hints that the favorable Tunnel talk in because of the pending by-election here, likely to result from one of our representatives being appointed a Senator. "The prospect of a contest," it says, "has opened the mind of the Government to the merits of the Tunnel project." Be that as it may, Mr Fielding has rendered the Island some service in the past, and we think would like to do more for us. If the Island is to share in the "good things that are going" it can only come to us by open transportation to and from the mainland, summer and winter. That the Tunnel would give.

THE BRITISH COLUMBIA ELECTIONS TODAY.

Today is election day in British Columbia. There are 42 members to be elected. At the last election in February, 1907, there were 26 Conservatives, 13 Liberals and three Socialists returned. Victoria City returns four and Vancouver five members. The principal issue in the elections is the contract entered into by Premier McBride to guarantee the bonds of the Canadian Northern Railway Company to the extent of 4 per

cent on \$35,000 per mile for some 600 miles of road from Yellow Head Pass in the Rockies to Vancouver city. Owing to a difference of four cents in time, it may not be possible to hear from the entire Province before The Guardian goes to press tomorrow morning, although the cities may form an exception. Victoria, Vancouver and New Westminster all went solidly Conservative at the last election.
