**Manslaughter Case Opens; Evidence Heard**

The preliminary hearing of Joseph B. Arsenault, charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of Daniel MacQuarrie, opened yesterday before Stipendiary Magistrate George J. Tweedy in the Supreme Court building.

MacQuarrie was found lying on the road near Milton on Sunday Aug. 4th, in the early hours of the morning. He was unconscious and died in the hospital three days later without regaining consciousness.

Cross examination on the seventh witness was getting underway late yesterday afternoon when the hearing was adjourned until 2 p. m. today.

Mr. C. St. Clair Trainer, K. C. appeared for the Crown and Mr. J. J. Johnston, K. C., for the accused.

Most of the evidence given was the same as that which was tendered at the Coroner's inquest. Two new witnesses were heard. These were Royal S. MacBeth of the Provincial Department of Public Works who made a survey on July 26th of the scene of the accident. The Constable James C. Cameron of the R.C.M.P. who took several photographs in connection with the case.

Dr. P. W. Tidmarsh, Charlottetown Physician and Surgeon, told of examining the body at the hospital. He stated that MacQuarrie came to his death as a result of a "fracture at the base of the skull." The death occurred on Wednesday, Aug. 7th.

He said there were two wounds—one behind the left ear and the other on the nape of the neck.

Witnesses at the examining a car at the R.C.M.P. barracks measured the distance between the jagged pieces of metal above the windshield and they were 2 1-4 inches apart.

Mr. A. B. Cutcliffe, Charlottetown Funeral Director, told of Constable Cameron photographing the wounds on the back of MacQuarrie's head. The same officer in company with Sgt. Engel came back the same afternoon (Aug. 8th) and measured the distance between the wounds. The distance was 2 1-4 inches, he testified.

He also told of taking a sample of MacQuarrie's hair and giving it to the R.C.M.P. Some of the hair was black and some gray. The sample was taken near the wound, he said.

Allan Gauthier, North Rustico fish dealer, told of leaving Charlottetown about 12:30 a.m. (Daylight Saving) and on the other side of the waterworks picked up a passenger who got in the back of the truck.

There were a number of other passengers in the truck and when witness reached the Hally Hill he noticed several cars on the right hand side of the road. There had been an accident and he slowed up but on being informed that help was not needed kept on going.

**Apparently Drinking**

At the Rustico Road he stopped and the passenger who had hailed him near the waterworks got out. He did not know the man witness said and when asked by Mr. Trainer if the passenger he picked up was sober, Gauthier replied that he had "apparently" been drinking. When witness picked him up the man was walking straight and there was no indication that he was drunk. The man was carrying something like a sweater on his arm, witness testified.

Cross examined by Mr. Johnston, witness said Hally Hill was about 5 1-2 miles from Charlottetown and he did not stop there but noticed several cars on the hill. He was able to pass easily.

Mr. MacBeth, engineer in employ of Provincial Department of Public Works, told of making a sketch on August 16th of the Malpeque Road from the intersection of the Rustico Road about 600 feet west. The pavement is 18 feet wide there.

Mr. Johnston objected to certain markings on the engineer's plans as likely to influence other witnesses in giving their evidence. (Examination of the witness was discontinued.)

Mrs. LeRoy Sherrin, Rustico, who accompanied Allan Gauthier in the truck which left Charlottetown testified that the man who hailed the car and was taken aboard was Daniel MacQuarrie. He was not sober nor drunk, could walk straight, had apparently been drinking.

(Cross examined by Mr. Johnston.)

A noticed crowd on Hally Hill but could not tell what was going on. MacQuarrie was in the back of the truck then, singing all the time.

Robert Moore, Milton, testified that he left Charlottetown between 12 and 1 o'clock (Daylight Saving) for home in his own car. His home is 30 chains west of the White House.

Passing a car near his home, witness saw what he thought was a body lying on the shoulder of the road. He noticed a boot sticking out of the grass first. Witness went in home and woke his father and both came back and investigated.

The man was living and witness was not moved. The man arrived, he added.

Cross examined, witness said he fixed the time by a clock near "Pat's" Restaurant. On the way home he stopped near the waterworks and helped another motorist to get his car started. He had met several cars near St. Dunstan's college before the way out.

Whitley River, testified that he left town about 12:30 with two passengers, Arthur Ross and Mary Bulman. He was driving the car going in the same direction. This car was going from one side of the road to the other. Witness trailed it for a quarter of a mile then passed it. At Hally Hill he heard a crash behind him and stopped his car. He got out and went back with Arthur Ross. About 100 yards behind there was a car upset in the ditch with a man in it sitting behind the wheel, he said. They helped the man up on the road along with the help of some other men who were driving another car.

Witness thought the car was a 1931 or 1932 Plymouth. It had wire wheels. One front light lens was broken, also the windshield was cracked. The driver of the car, witness has not seen. Witness got Ross to get into the damaged car and coast it around the front of his to avoid any danger of being run into. This car then went on ahead of witness.

**Identified Accused**

Asked by Mr. Trainer if he knew the man, witness said he did not. He replied in the affirmative when he was asked if he had seen the man since. Witness then identified the accused as the man who was in the car which upset in the ditch on Hally Hill.

Cross examined by Mr. Johnston, witness said "he did not smell liquor" but the man who had the accident on Hally Hill witness did not pass the man after the accident.

Arthur Ross, Wheatley River, corroborated the evidence of the previous witnesses. He identified the accused as the man who was in the car which he helped out of the ditch on Hally Hill.

Mary Bulman, Hunter River, corroborated the evidence of the two previous witnesses.

Irwin Blondin, Glen Valley School teacher, told of helping get the upset car out of the ditch at Hally Hill. He was coming from Charlottetown in the new high truck driven by Lorrain Bentley when they came to the scene of the accident.


Witness was not talking to the driver of the car which had upset, but noticed that the man walked unsteadily which could be caused from the shock of the accident or from drinking, he said. Witness also described the damage to the car which corresponded to the description given by the other witnesses.

rare in the 13 administrative divisions established for purposes of the draft, will notify, by registered letter, those who are to report for examination for the first 30-day training period.

There are more than 78,000 single men or childless widowers in the 21-year old class who will be subject to the first call but in view of the fact that a 25 per cent rejection for physical unfitness is expected, and the possibility that one or more divisions might not have its quota of that age class, some may be taken from the 22-year-old class to make up the deficiency.

The first proclamation will treat all who are subject to call as being at the age they had reached by July 1 last. Subsequent proclamations will deal with the question of those who have entered the 21-year-class or advanced beyond it since registration.

It is not the intention to call out men engaged in farm work for the first training period and in other ways the department will endeavour to so arrange the calls that essential industrial undertakings will not be unduly disrupted, so long as such workers get in their period of training within 12 months.

The fee for each examination, to be paid monthly to the doctors by the Government is \$1.
