Reviews Local Legion Activities

The following report was submitted by retiring president Leo Bradley, D.C.M., at the recent annual meeting of the Charlottetown Branch of The Canadian Legion: "In reviewing the activities of this Branch for the past year I feel that we have passed through a very historical year; momentous events have occurred; early in May we had V. E. Day, when the German Army surrendered. Then in August came V.J. Day and the Japanese were beaten to the ground. Will any of us ever witness another year like it?—At least let us hope we shall never have to witness another war.

"Now the young men and women who won the victory are coming home—to what? A better Canada where the still fit may engage in gainful occupation? In many parts of Canada, yes, but also in our own Province, no. There are no industries to occupy our City men and women; a lot of the farm boys will go back to the land, but a lot will not. A number of men who were fishermen by occupation will go back to that industry. Men and women who were in school, colleges and universities have an opportunity to complete their courses, and others who qualify can take Vocational Training, but there are thousands of men who can not qualify. In our own Province the Training School is only in the course of erection and will be completed as soon as possible, and will undoubtedly prove a boon for returned Veterans.

**Veterans' Hospitalization**  
"Hospitalization of Island Veterans, on the Island—The Department of Veterans Affairs has been procrastinating for over two years about this because we are unfortunately part of M.D. No. 6 and they want full control in this matter. The Legion has been fighting it for a long time without success. I might say that at the present time we have other negotiations under way in this connection.

**Increased Membership**  
"During the year the different committees have co-operated almost to a man. The membership committee under the chairmanship of Comrade H.H. Gour, B.A., M.S.M., have been untiring in their efforts to have paid-up membership, along with an increased membership, and I thank them sincerely. We are a very hearty welcome to all our new members.

**Railway & Civil Service**  
"As far as the Railway is concerned, men or rather boys have stepped in and have their seniority rights, which should have never been taken away from them.

**House Committee**  
"The house committee, under the chairmanship of Comrade James H. McKenna, M.M., has also performed splendid service for the Branch. A new supporting wall in front of the home was erected, and improvements in the interior, and they are now embarked on a larger program.

In the evening a banquet was held in the Charlottetown Hotel and the guest speaker was Comrade T.A. McLennan, of Trinity United Church, and it was an address which should be read by all Comrades.

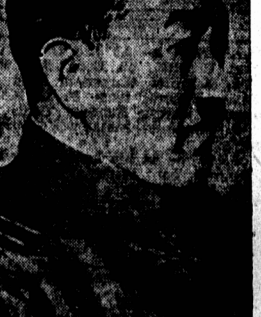

A resolution was passed which drew attention to the fact that, according to the N. B. Liquor Control Board, over two-thirds of the adult population of the province are alcoholics. It is estimated that over \$9,000,000 were "squandered" in the legal sale of
