Resolutions The following were among the resolutions adopted at the convention:

Mother's Allowance: We again urge the Provincial Government to take steps to enact legislation for the payment of Allowances to Mothers who are left in dire need owing to the death of the bread winner of the family. It is a matter of regret that our Province should be the only one that has not put into effect such legislation.

Minimum Wage Law: We again press the Provincial Government to enact legislation to ensure that a minimum wage standard is set up in this Province so that all workers may be assured of a decent living wage.

Rural Electrification: We again urge the Provincial Government to proceed with its program of rural electrification as promised during the last general election in 1943. (Wellington.)

Employment in Provincial Government Positions: We again urge the Provincial Government to put into effect the resolution adopted by the Provincial Legislature to give a preference to ex-service men and women when making appointments to the Government service and we offer the assistance of every Legion Branch in this Province to secure a competent person to fill any vacancy. We again request that the Provincial Command of the Legion receive notification of any vacancy occurring.

Public Works and Bridges at St. Peter's: Resolved that the Department of Public Works be requested to co-operate with the citizens of St. Peter's in their efforts to improve the drainage of the village by filling in and tilling the drainage ditches along the Highway.

And that the Canadian National Railways be requested to put in a culvert under the Highway at the east side of the Cardigan Road at the entrance to St. Peter's Bridge to carry away the water that makes the highway impassable during the spring floods.

Workers' Compensation Act: Resolved that we again strongly urge the Provincial Government to enact a suitable Workers' Compensation Act that will be applicable to all employees in this Province.

Elmira Branch Railway: Resolved that the Canadian National Railways be requested to put into effect a better train schedule to care for passenger and freight needs for those people living between Souris and Elmira. This is a large and important section of Prince Edward Island and is thickly settled and ships large quantities of farm and fish products, yet for years it has been given a very inadequate train service.

Medical Treatment: We desire to commend the Department of Veterans' Affairs for the splendid facilities made available in the Provincial Hospital for the medical treatment of our veterans. The high standard of nursing staff the high words of praise we have heard from those Veterans who are undergoing and have undergone treatment. The setting up of a repairs depot in Charlottetown where minor repairs can be made to prosthetic appliances is a forward step in the care of our seriously disabled veterans.

Rural Mail Couriers: Resolved that we urge the Dominion Government to abolish the contract system followed in securing rural mail carriers and urge the Government to set up a plan whereby the Civil Service Commission would make all such appointments, thus doing away with a cut-throat system; and ensuring that these carriers receive adequate remuneration. (Charlottetown.)

Housing: We again point out to the Federal Government that the continued acute shortage in housing accommodation and particularly the shortage of houses available for rental and we again urge the necessity of providing some plan of subsidization to enable the current high rents to secure suitable housing accommodation.

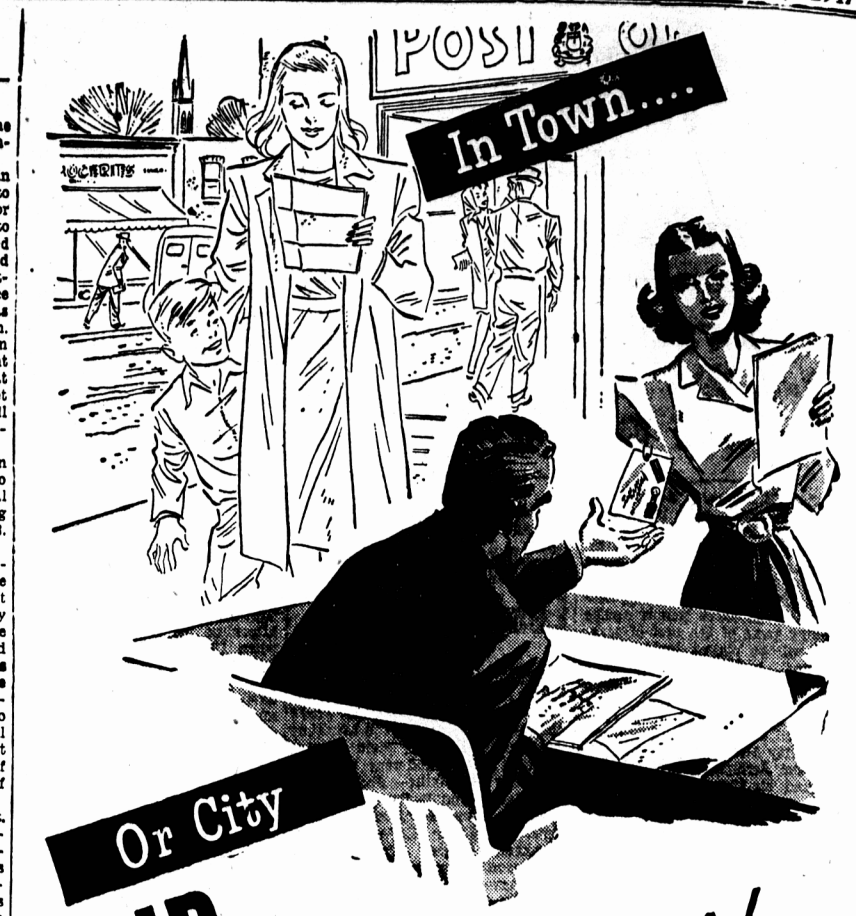
It must be very evident that a great many cannot possibly afford to pay the high rents demanded and there is a desperate need among those in the lower income brackets and assistance must be given to enable them to secure decent homes.

Appointment of Meat Grader: Resolved that the Dominion Government be requested to put into effect regulations providing for the inspection and grading of meats in this Province and that a Meat Grader be appointed so that raisers of beef cattle may be encouraged to improve the quality of beef cattle by being able to have the better quality graded as Red or Blue Brand and be paid accordingly.

Deep Sea Salmon Fishing: We wish to point out that a valuable deep sea industry of drift net fishing for salmon in the waters surrounding the Island is being neglected by our Island fishermen. We understand that Prince Edward Island fishermen are unable to secure licences for this fishing under present regulations and the waters around the Island are being fished by fishermen from the mainland.

We do urge that this be carefully investigated and the regulations amended so the Island fishermen may participate in this industry.

Basic Rate of Pensions: Resolved that the Federal Government be petitioned to give consideration to a general increase in the basic rate of disability pensions in view of the much increased cost of living, the increase in wages paid to all employees. We point out that the United States Government has already given consideration to these factors and increased pensions by twenty per cent and that in all fairness to Canada's disability pensioners our Government should take similar action. (Cardigan.)
