THE WESTERN SITUATION.—Rev. Dr. Gauthier, Palmer's Road, was in the city yesterday. He attended a meeting of the executive of the Sheep Breeders' Association on Monday when usual arrangements were made for the season for the grading and selling of wool co-operatively. Yesterday in conjunction with Mr. Pope and Mr. Tidmarsh of the committee of the Development Association, he started to examine the papers and award the prizes in the M. J. Heaney Prize Competition. There were twenty-two papers from different parts of the Island. With regard to conditions in the western part of the Island, Dr. Gauthier reported as follows:—The farmers, especially in Tignish, are face to face with a shortage of fodder. Not only is the cost high, but there is considerable difficulty in getting transportation. Fully seventy-five per cent of the farmers in this district have to buy their feed. So far, from \$7,000 to \$8,000 worth of hay has been bought. Quite a lot of potatoes have been moved from that part of the west. Some individual farmers have each received as high as \$5,000 for produce sold. The fishing promises well. Herring and lobsters are reported plentiful.

SEED REPRESENTATIVE.—Among the visitors to the City yesterday was Mr. G. LeLachur, representing the Seed Branch, Ottawa. Mr. LeLachur is a native of Murray Harbour and was formerly Principal of the McDonald Consolidated School at Hillsboro. He has been for four years connected with the Seed Branch at Ottawa. He has been all through Ontario, Quebec and Nova Scotia in connection with the growing of field root and vegetable seeds, and is continuing the work in his native province during the next month or six weeks. It will be noted that the turkeys which the farmers will plant, are to be inspected and this work will be done and contracts placed by Mr. LeLachur. His headquarters will be in Charlottetown and he can be reached through the Agricultural Department. The wholesale prices for Sweden turkeys reports has gone up about 100 per cent since the war began and the necessity of island farmers growing their own seed is certainly obvious. The island is specially adapted for growing turkeys, cabbage and parsnip seed, car cold moist climate being favorable for producing and ripening these seeds to perfection. Applications come in. Mr. LeLachur will go out and meet the growers and discuss the situation with them. (Special to the Guardian.)

A meeting of the National Service League with employers of labour, was held in the Assembly room last evening, the Director, Hon. J. A. MacDonald presiding. A proposal to have a central office on a main thoroughfare was approved, and a committee appointed to make the necessary arrangements. On the motion of Mr. Hyndman, seconded by Rev. R. G. Fulton, it was agreed to support the petition of the Board of Trade to have the widening of the railway gauge hurried forward in time for the fall and winter transportation of produce.
