The schooner Frank, which was stranded at the entrance of Cascumpeq Harbor a few weeks ago, was refloated on Saturday last.

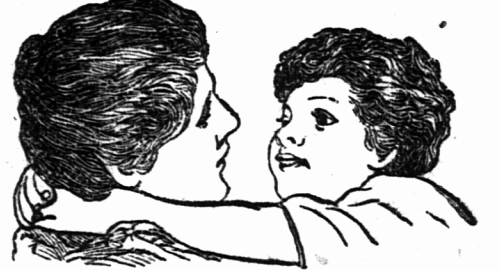

THREE NIGHTS OF SHAKESPEARE

The Lyceum Company Appeared Last Night in "Hamlet," and To-night Will Give us "Merchant of Venice"

We are to have three nights of Shakespeare given by the Lyceum company. This short season opened last night with "Hamlet," says the Halifax Herald of recent date. "The audience was fairly large and was a sympathetic and appreciative one, and the company is satisfactory. Edouard D'Oize took the part of "Hamlet" and succeeded in winning a considerable measure of applause.

He was painstaking and faithful in his work and the difficult role—one that taxes the greatest men of the stage and to undertake which used to be considered the height of the actor's ambition—was handled in a creditable way. Mr. D'Oize's conception of the character was intelligent and pleasing, but the full effect of his work was somewhat interfered with by a voice that hardly seemed inadequate.

Miss Elsie Hart was "Ophelia," and her portrayal of the character was eminently satisfactory; indeed, it was one of the very best features of the performance. This talented lady has previously been heard in Halifax, and she will always be welcome. Elmer Batham deserves much praise for his rendering of Laertes. He was full of fire and was good in every respect.

The great diggers were admirable, and Messrs. Colvin and Boeke left nothing to be desired.

Taken in all, the Lyceum Company is deserving of the patronage of theatre-goers and particularly of Shakespeare lovers.
