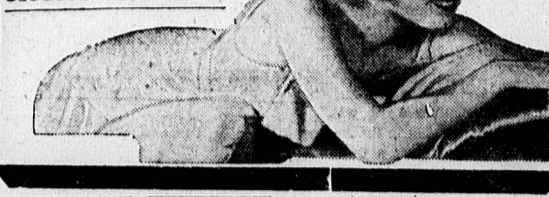

VALUE OF OUR RAILWAY

In the Investment in Road and Equipment account of the Canadian Government Railways, Prince Edward Island Railway was valued at \$14,550,886.13 at December, 31, 1929 to which was added during 1930, \$547,564.27, making the total at March 31, 1931, \$15,098,450.40.

C. N. R. HOTEL—The value of the Canadian National Hotel at Charlottetown is entered in the balance sheet of the Government Railways as \$689,460.14. The Nova Scotia Halifax is valued at \$2,358,483. Murray River property is valued at \$7,540.04.

RAILWAY EMPLOYEES COMPENSATION—Under the Government Employees Compensation Act the number of Prince Edward Island claims on which compensation, medical aid and pensions were distributed during the months of January, February and March, 1931, was 12, totalling \$1,836.26. For the year ending that date the total was 74 representing 5,836.20.

AT ROTARY—The Rotary meeting yesterday was held under the joint chairmanship of Rotarians George J. Tweedy and Al Fisher and it was a business meeting. Rotarian James M. Murley submitted a report on the Rotary bridge and dance, and a vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Mutch, chairman of the committee, and Mr. Murley, who had arranged the details, also to Manager Mould and staff of the Canadian National Hotel. The question of the disposal of the returns from the horse races last fall was discussed and President Hornby announced that the matter would be dealt with at a meeting of the executive in the afternoon. The musical programme comprised enjoyable solos by Mrs. Frances Holl Trainor, who was encored. The guest of honor was Dr. E. A. Clark of the staff of the Ontario Hospital at Hamilton, Ont., who has come to Charlottetown to aid the Government of Prince Edward Island in reorganizing the psychiatric branch of the Department of Public Health, since the destruction of Falconwood Hospital. Dr. Clark was introduced by Rotarian Hon. Dr. MacMillan. The chairman of the fine arts committee, Rotarian Hal Palmer, presented his report which created considerable amusement.
