**FASHIONS FOR CANADIANS**

A painstaking study of the sea-  
son's style range compels one to  
admit that there is nothing really  
new in the way of silhouette or ac-  
tual "line," but this does not at all  
mean that there are not novel id-  
eas in abundance if one only takes  
the trouble to find them or think  
them out. The frock shown in the  
sketch helps to prove this state-  
ment.

It is just about as simple, as far  
as style line is concerned, as a  
frock could well be, but when con-  
sidered in detail it is decidedly un-  
usual and also decidedly charming.  
It is developed in a soft, change-  
able taffeta in tones of pink and  
silver. A silver lace flounce of the  
metal lace trims the modestly cut  
neck. An additional touch of the  
silver is carried in the ribbon,  
which girdles the waist and ties in  
a bow at the back.

The real feature of the frock is  
the petal trimming. These petals  
are made of pink satin, each one  
lined so that several tones of the  
pink appear, and lined with a  
very thin black silk or satin, the  
two sections of the petal being glu-  
ed together. This stiffens them a  
trifle, and they are caught to the  
frock with the merest thread of  
sewing (firmly, but lightly) stand-  
ing away from the fabric of the  
frock in the prettiest way imagin-  
able.

The dress would be lovely devel-  
oped in a pale yellow and trimmed  
with petals in red or in brown and  
golden tones.

Simplicity continues to be the  
dominant style note, if simplicity  
can be said to be dominant, small  
out-of-ordinary touches serving to  
give distinction to this season's  
outer garments.

For example, a simple frock of  
yellow organdy recently seen was  
made unusual by the trimming—a  
skirt border formed of round sec-  
tions of blue and white checked  
gingham in various sizes, daintily  
hemstitched into the organdy. A  
plain coat dress of heavy white lin-



stood out from the crowd be-  
cause of its bright trimming. An  
inch-wide frill of bright red or-  
gandy edged it all about. Red but-  
tons and an inch-wide belt of red  
leather completed the frock.

**CHAMPION PRICED BULL DEAD  
FROM POISONING**

**Stewiacke Is  
Threatened by Fire**

STEWIACKE, May 2.—Stewiacke  
was threatened with total destruc-  
tion by fire. The conflagration  
started 1.30 this morning and  
twelve or fifteen dwellings were  
razed to the ground. The fire was  
still burning at an early hour. It  
is said to have originated in Mc-  
Nutt Hotel.

BROCKVILLE, April 2.—The  
famous Holstein bull which A. C.  
Hardy, proprietor of Avondale  
Stock farm here sold four years  
ago at an auction in Milwaukee,  
to a representative of the Carnat-  
Farms, in Seattle, for \$106,000 is  
dead.  
The animal was only six months  
old at the time of the sale, and the  
price paid for it has never been  
equalled on the North American  
continent.  
The bull died from poisoning,  
caused by holding an injured knee  
which was being treated.
