where Mrs. LeBlanc was taken said that she was resting as comfortably as could be expected and that May was rather badly burned about the face, hands, neck and feet. Mr. LeBlanc was burned and bruised considerably but was not taken to the hospital. The LeBlanc house was located on North Market Street. The fire broke out about 10.30 p.m.

Leasing of oyster beds and lobster poaching were strongly condemned at the annual convention of the Prince Edward Island Fishermen's Union in Charlottetown yesterday.

Spoken for several local stations of the Union declared that not only were honest fishermen hard pressed to stand up under the strain of illegal fishing but that the present season was also unsuitable for certain sections.

The delegates strongly condemned the action of the Dominion Government in the leasing of oyster beds and a quite lengthy discussion took place with Premier Campbell and Federal members of parliament for the Province participating. The fishermen in a resolution urged the local government to rebate the full eight cents gasoline tax to fishermen.
