REV. C. H. McLEARN.

On the morning of February 23rd last, the gentle and strong spirit of the Rev. C. H. McLearn passed peacefully from earth to heaven. The translation was from the Baptist Parsonage at North River, P. E. I., which for nearly three years had been his happy and hospitable home. Mr. McLearn was a rare spirit. He was naturally scholarly in his tastes and he enjoyed the advantages of the schools of learning. He attended Acadia College, and graduated in the full course of Theological Seminary, Mass., 1893. He was a good Hebrew and Greek scholar, and it was his custom until within a few weeks of his death to translate from the Hebrew Bible or the Greek New Testament at the family altar. He attended the school of divinity and a scholar has gone to his reward. The early ministry of Rev. C. H. McLearn was spent in Maine, U. S., where he held important and successful pastorates. He was always greatly beloved by the people. Sickness compelled him to leave Nova Scotia, his native province, except to die. But God ordered otherwise, and he was permitted to give nearly eleven years of fruitful ministry to important pastorates in the Maritime Provinces. Wherever he served it was with much acceptance. He preached salvation by the cross of Christ and he had the joy of seeing many hopefully converted under his ministry. He was a good man and true, and he is sincerely mourned by a host of friends. His ministry on the North River Field was much appreciated and the people showed their genuine affection for him and his talented wife by many acts of kindness. The funeral services were held in the North River Baptist Church on Wednesday afternoon, Feb. 24. The Church was filled with sympathetic friends. Members of the Charlottetown Baptist Choir assisted in the music. Rev. Z. L. Fash preached the funeral sermon. It was a tender tribute to a dear friend. Reverends W. P. McVie, George Orman and L. E. Ackland gave testimony of the genuine worth and Christian manhood of the departed. It was a touching and beautiful service to Charlottetown. The body was taken to Middleton, N. S., for burial. A service was held in the Baptist Church, Middleton, N. S., on Friday afternoon, Feb. 26. Rev. M. W. Brown, a friend for forty years, preached the sermon, and addresses were given by Rev. H. G. Mellick and Rev. Z. L. Fash. The interment was in the beautiful Pine Grove Cemetery. Mrs. McLearn has the sympathy of her many friends in this time of sore bereavement.

HEATING ORCHARDS. One of the greatest feats of artificial outdoor heating ever attempted was resorted to by some fruitgrowers in Colorado, to save a crop of fruit estimated at \$3,000,000 in value. Thousands upon thousands upon smudge pots were scattered through the orchards over 27 miles of territory, and the raising of temperature that resulted, effectually dispelled the freezing frost. The smudge pots used were of many different types, some burning oil and others coal. The temperature in the orchards was actually raised 8 degrees and 9 degrees over the entire 27 miles of territory, as many as 300,000 smudge pots being used.

FAMOUS ISLAND SHOT IS DEAD

Mr. Christopher Johnson who Carried off the Kolo-pore Cup for his Team Dies Aged Seventy-Four.

Mr Samuel Johnson and Mr. Neil Johnson, Peters Road, Lot 63, have received word of the death of their brother, Mr. Christopher Johnson, of McAdam, and formerly of Fredericton and Georgetown. Mr. Johnson was a carpenter in Georgetown and was one of the volunteers who formed a guard of honor on the occasion of the visit to Charlottetown of King Edward VII., when Prince of Wales. For many years Mr. Johnson was employed as a cabinet maker in C. E. shops in Fredericton. The deceased was seventy-four years of age and is survived by a family of three sons and two daughters. The sons are J. B., of McAdam, William, of Fernie, B. C., and H. C. of Seattle, and the daughters are Mrs. Johnnie MacNeil of Wain, B. C., and Mrs. Arthur Dunn, of Milner, B. C.

A NOTED MARKSMAN.

Mr. Johnson spent the closing years of his life quietly at McAdam and few people of the present generation were acquainted with the man who was ago he was the most famous marksman in all Canada and had won honor for his country in competition with the crack shots of the world on the Wimbledon Common. One who enjoyed an intimate acquaintance with the late Mr. Johnson was Col. T. C. Loggie, formerly commanding officer of the 71st regiment, who on three occasions represented Canada at Wimbledon. "I am very sorry," said Col. Loggie to the Mail, "to hear of the death of my old friend, Mr. Johnson. I thought about him for many years, and I had planned to make a special trip out to McAdam to see him. He had been living at McAdam for many years and was little known to the present generation. All the same, you can take it from me that he was the most brilliant shot that New Brunswick ever produced."

WON KOLAPORE CUP.

Col. Loggie went on to say that when he first knew Mr. Johnson the latter was living in St. John and was a sapper with the New Brunswick Engineers, a corps which had been sent to Confederation. He afterwards removed to Fredericton and joined the 71st Regt. as an ensign soon after its formation. He participated in provincial and Dominion matches in the late sixties and won many prizes and medals. He was chosen to represent the first Canadian rifle team sent to Wimbledon in the year 1871. It was in that year that the Rajah of Kolapore donated his cup to the National Rifle Association to be competed for by teams from Great Britain and her colonies. It was by four points shot by teams of twenty men, but the number was afterwards reduced to eight. Mr. Johnson was selected as one of the Canadian team but as he was not available when the match was started it was decided to shoot with seven men a side and allow the odd men to finish the match later on. The seven men match resulted in the English and Canadian teams tying for the cup. Mr. Johnson was then called on to shoot off against the eighth man from the English team. The old Snider rifle was used and in the standing position at two hundred yards Mr. Johnson beat his man four points. At the five hundred yard range he was himself beaten four points. This left them with scores tied at the beginning of the six hundred yard range, but at this distance Mr. Johnson was ahead by four points and won the much coveted Kolapore Cup for Canada. The victory was entirely due to Johnson's coolness and wonderful marksmanship and he was the hero of the hour with his Canadian associates on the team.

It is interesting to note that the deceased's nephew, Mr. Lester C. Johnson, son of Mr. Samuel Johnson, is also a distinguished shot. He enlisted in Vancouver in the 7th Batt., Duke of Connaught's Own Rifles and was the second best shot in his battalion. He is now at the front and recent cablegrams show that he is a lieutenant and one of the men of his company have been killed in action. Naturally his family here are eagerly and anxiously scanning the telegrams to see whether the Connaught's have been in further action.

X-RAYS STOP SMUGGLING.

The British contraband inspectors at New York who search American trade vessels bound for Germany have an ingenious method of finding out whether bales of merchandise contain guns, ammunition, copper, or other goods which would aid our enemies in the war. This is carried out by means of an X-ray apparatus. Before being shipped each bale of cotton is placed on a truck and a glass globe showing a pale green light is pushed up against the side of the package. Two assistants take their places on the opposite side, each armed with an instrument known as a fluoroscope. The end of the fluoroscope is covered with a screen, coated with a chemical substance, which has the property of glowing when X-rays strike it. The rays pass freely through cotton, but they do not pass through metal; consequently if there were metal inside one of the bales it would cut off part of the rays, and the inspector would see the shadow of the article on the fluoroscope screen.

The X-rays can be run through a bale in a few minutes, and by this means hundreds of pounds of cotton can be thoroughly searched in a few hours.—Tit Bits.
