**U. S. Steel Profits**  
**Up 40 p.c. in 1946**

CLEVELAND, Feb. 8—Net profits in the steel industry for 1946 will average about 40 per cent higher than in 1945, the magazine Steel estimated today.

The reason, said the publication, is that during the war the steel companies established cash funds "to meet post-war contingencies."

"Preliminary reports from several large producers operating 70 per cent of the industry's total ingot capacity show aggregate net income at nearly \$100,000,000 which is 43 per cent above the 1945 levels of these same companies," said Steel.

"The industry's production continues at levels eclipsing any previous peace-time figures by wide margins, with current production far above the industry's total capacity to produce before the war."

"Last week's heavy weather cut into metalworking operations largely because of gas shortages in the Midwest," the magazine reported, but "steel ingot operations were not adversely affected to any great degree."

Steel's national ingot production index for last week was 92 per cent, down half a point from the post-war high.

**IN MEMORIAM**

**EDWARD J. MALONE**  
 Many friends in P. E. Island especially those in the vicinity of Emyvale and Greenbay will learn with deep regret of the sudden death of E. J. Malone in the city of Regina on Saturday the 27th day of January.

Mr. Malone for some few months had not been in the robust condition that his appearance would lead us to believe he was. He had been troubled with a heart ailment but under the skillful treatment of his physician, Dr. Israel was gradually regaining his old time vigor and had been working up to the moment of his death when he suddenly collapsed.

Less than one week previous to and his wife with a few other friends had passed a social evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Fred C. Monaghan, who was always noted for his highly developed sense of humor and his presence in any company was an assurance that there would be many a hearty laugh at his witty remarks during the evening was over, on the particular night he was at his best and when the sad news of his death and his presence in any later in the week it fell like a shock upon our ears.

As he was known to his friends was born in Greenbay, P. E. I. 17 years ago the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Michael Malone of that place, he was educated in the public schools and Prince of Wales College after obtaining a teacher's certificate he taught for a short period in his native province then went to Saskatchewan where he continued to teach later attending Campion College, Regina, where he obtained his degree of B. A. He then accepted the principalship of Holy Rosary School, Regina for two years after which he went into business for himself.

Financially he was a success as his beautiful well furnished home at 2161 Retaille Street, city of Regina will testify.

When quite young he married Mary Ellen Duffy of Emyvale who with three children survive him, Joseph and Ralph of Regina and Helen of Toronto who on being notified that her father was dead came immediately to Regina by plane.

Mr. Malone was a deeply religious man, a faithful husband, a benevolent father and a true friend. On Tuesday morning, January 28th, a solemn requiem mass was sung by his brother, Rev. Ralph Malone of Edmonton assisted by Rev. Father Phalen and Rev. Father Cross as deacon and subdeacon. In the sanctuary were several other priests, amongst whom were Rev. Fathers Murphy, Rector of Campion College, Rev. Maurice Monaghan, Campion College and Rev. Father Walsh.

**Soft or Crusty rolls:**  
 Cut off small uniform pieces, fold sides under until top is smooth and evenly baked. This is a good way to have fresh rolls without going to the trouble of mixing the dough every time you want to make a batch. For good results it is very important that the mixture be kept in a cold place, covered to prevent the yeast from working.

**Cloverleaf Rolls:**  
 Shape into small pieces of dough into balls, brush with melted fat and place 3 balls in each muffin tin.

**Finger Rolls:**  
 Shape dough into uniform small pieces, shape into balls. With the palm of the hand roll until of desired length, taking care to make them smooth.

**Crescents:**  
 Roll dough 1-4 inch thick and using a sharp knife, cut in 3 inch squares. Brush with melted fat; starting at one corner, roll to opposite corner, pressing the points firmly down while rolling. Bring the two ends almost together to form the crescent.

**Knots:**  
 Roll dough 1-2 inch thick, cut in narrow strips and roll with palm hand into 8-inch strips. Tie in a loose knot.

**Twists:**  
 Prepare strips as for knots. Twist narrow ends in opposite directions, then bring ends together and pluck, to hold firmly.

**Refrigerator Rolls**  
 1 cake compressed yeast OR  
 1 tablespoon quick rising dry yeast  
 1 cup lukewarm water  
 1 teaspoon sugar  
 1-2 cup shortening  
 1-2 cup sugar  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 1 cup hot mashed potatoes  
 1 cup scalded milk  
 2 eggs (well beaten)  
 6-7 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
 Dissolve yeast in lukewarm water and add the teaspoon of sugar. Place shortening, sugar and salt in mixing bowl. Add mashed potatoes and cream well. Combine lukewarm milk, eggs and dissolved yeast. Add to first mixture. Add flour to make a stiff dough. Toss on floured board and knead well. Place in a large greased bowl and let rise until double in bulk, if rolls are to be baked immediately. Knead slightly, shape into rolls as desired, cover and let rise until light. Bake in hot oven, 400 degrees F. for 15-20 minutes.

If this dough is to be stored in refrigerator before baking, after first kneading place in a greased container, brush surface with melted fat and cover tightly. About 1-2 hours before baking time shape into rolls as desired. Let rise until light and bake as above.

**Empire Life President Stresses Economic Improvement**

KINGSTON, Feb. 8 — "A record gain in volume of insurance in force, as compared with any previous year," was reported by C. F. Fell, President of the Empire Life Insurance Co., at the annual meeting. "New 1946-for business in 1946 was \$14,282,634, the net gain \$9,288,780, and total insurance in force was \$70,970,105 at the year-end."

Reviewing Canada's position in the world, Mr. Fell said: "A reading of some of the 1946 Reviews of Business and Financial Conditions might very readily leave one with a distinct sense of frustration, in their emphasis on the difficulties of the year, in particular the strikes, the higher costs, the lack of raw materials, the acute labour shortages, the government trading in commodities, the inordinately high taxation, the publicity concerning our Dominion and Provincial relations, to mention only a few."

"Our superficial disabilities would undoubtedly weigh us down if we did not from time to time rise above them and assess our comparative economic position for what it really is. Canada in 1946 enjoyed probably the most favourable combination of business and financial conditions of any country in the world. And this conclusion may be stated with equal force today."

"It is unnecessary to recite all the details, but may I mention just a few of the more important facts of the year:

1. The total value of all the final goods and services produced within the country approximated the 11 billion dollar level during 1946, which is more than double the pre-war rate;

2. Last June there were 800,000 more people in gainful employment in Canada than in 1939, and in manufacturing alone it was 71% larger than 1939, in spite of the difficulties of reconversion from a wartime to a peacetime basis of production;

3. Construction contracts awarded in 1946 were \$68,000,000 compared with \$175,000,000 in 1939;

4. Retail sales for the year and the cash income from the sale of all farm products were more than double those of 1939;

5. Loadings of railway revenue freight in 1946 were higher than any war year;

6. Savings deposits are at an all-time high indicating that household funds in the hands of the public are extremely large.

"One has but to recall (1) the desolation in Europe and Asia, (2) the economic plight of the United Kingdom and its counterparts by austere plans to deal with fundamental problems, and (3) the political turmoil and unrest all over the world—to con-  
 clude that we have cause to congratulate ourselves not only on our present lot, but also on the prospects that lie before us."
