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present, have played. The sense of play is almost as well developed as the religious sense. Scripture has a great deal to say about this subject of amusement and recreation. The old prophet of Israel spoke of the streets of the city being full of boys and girls playing in the streets thereof. The matter of play forms an important part in the lives of the people, and is responsible in many ways for the formation of character. Mr. McConnell here read extracts from sermons and letters from leading divines in the Roman Catholic, Anglican, Presbyterian, Baptist and Methodist Churches, which went to show that they were strictly opposed to dancing as irreconcilable with the gospel of Christ many classifying them as revolting and disgusting and stating that confirmation or communion would not be given to any whom it was known were votaries of these dances. The Archbishop of New York asserts that he learned by confession that 90 per cent. of the fallen women in New York began with dancing. This does not mean the women of the streets, but women and girls, who were respectable wives and daughters. The dance hall is the home of vice and prostitution. We cannot be consistent Christians and indulge in amusements of that kind. "If one goes into a dance hall and sees a man with his arms about another man's wife or sister, we may think nothing of it, but if we go into a home and see a man embracing another man's wife or sister, we are very likely to have strange and injurious thoughts concerning that woman, even if the man is respectable. The time was too limited to speak of card playing and the theatre, but if we could be consistent Christians and indulge in these, it was all right. "But I wish," continued the speaker, "that I could talk to those women who give so much of their precious time to these things. I wish I could persuade them that the time spent in these things could be spent in a much more useful way. The world has need of them. They could do so much to elevate and help some young life, but they have time for bridge whist and none for the work which God puts before them." The speaker concluded with an earnest appeal to his congregation to consider well what these vices meant before they gave of their time to these forms of so called "amusements."
