

Not Afraids Did Very Well in Candle Pins

MONCTON, May 8.—The Moncton Aces, premier ladies bowling team of this city defeated the Charlottetown Not Afraids, Prince Edward Island ladies champions by a 24 pin margin in the first of a series of two games, staged last evening on McDonald's alleys. The Aces won the match by a score of 1295 to 1261.

The winners took a seven point lead in the opening string and although the Not Afraids won the mid-die string by nine points, they came back to win the third string and the game by thirty six pins. Mrs Rayworth was the high scorer of the game and led the Aces attack with a total pinfall of 274. Miss Purcell was the high point maker for the visitors with 270.

The Not Afraids are on a tour of the Maritimes and will conclude their two game engagement tonight when they will meet the Aces again on McDonald's alleys. The teams will bowl five pins tonight at which the visitors are more adept, it being their customary game.

Reimbursement To Ex-Indian Army Officers

In the House of Commons recently the following questions were asked by Hon. John A. McDonald (Kings), and replied to by the Prime Minister:

Mr. MacDonald, (Kings): (1) What amount has been paid ex-Indian Army officers under vote of parliament item number 437, supplementary estimates for year ending March 31, 1930?

(2) What amount has the government of Prince Edward Island contributed, or paid to such army officers as its share in settlement of these claims?

(3) What are the names of those to whom paid, and the amounts paid to each, by the federal and provincial governments, respectively?

(4) What claims remain unpaid and what are the reasons for non-payment in each case?

Mr. MacKenzie King: (1) Payments were made, ex gratia, from a fund formed by joint contributions voted by the parliament of Canada and the legislature of Prince Edward Island, in accordance with the following account:

This amount was paid direct by the Prince Edward Island government to this claimant, who is now residing in that province, and the balance \$6,661.67 forwarded to Ottawa for transference to London.

Captain Allenby also made a general claim for interest and Paymaster Lieutenant Curtis intimated that he desired to submit a claim for expenses if they were being allowed. The legal advice bureau, British Legion, claimed the sum of £300, the costs of prosecution of Mitchell in England.

The amounts voted by parliament and the legislature of Prince Edward Island were intended to cover ex gratia payments and there was no admission of any legal liability on the part of either government. Consequently, direct losses were regarded as a primary claim and were paid out of the appropriation and they exhausted the fund.

St. John Vics Are Bowling Champs

HALIFAX, N. S., May 8.—The Brunswick Balke-Collender Bowling Pin Tournament emblematic of the candlepin bowling championship of Eastern Maine and the Maritime Provinces, was captured this morning by the St. John Victorias, who defeated Conn-Martels in a playoff this morning after the teams had finished on even terms in the nine game schedule. This morning, Victorias defeated the locals by a 1500-1468 score, a margin of 42 pins. In the first string the pin defenders captured a seven point lead, rolling 491 to 484. Coming back strong the Vics totalled 502 to 489 to take a seven point margin. In the final string, with a string of spares and strikes in the last two boxes, the St. John stars hammered out a total of 514 to 478 against.

U. S. PRESBYTERIES VOTE AGAINST THE ORDINATION OF WOMEN AS MINISTERS

PHILADELPHIA, May 8.—The Presbyterian Church will continue its refusal to ordain women as ministers, it was announced today at General Assembly headquarters.

Returns from individual Presbyteries, voting upon an overture sent down by the General Assembly resulted in defeat for the women, 150 to 101. All of the Presbyteries have not yet reported but 147 constitutes a majority.

The vote to date on a second overture which would permit ordination of women as ruling elders is: For, 142; against, 109. The acquiescence of five more Presbyteries is needed before this policy becomes church law.
