Reviews Education And Health Department Work

Speaking in the Budget debate in the Legislature on April 1, Hon. M.R. McGuigan, Minister of Public Health and Education, ended the Government for exceeding its estimates for Falconwood Hospital maintenance. These expenditures he maintained were more or less uncontrollable.

Medical men he maintained had no special training as administrators. There were exceptions to that rule, but the leader of the Opposition was not one of them. He took exception to the criticism in public health that in years gone by the Minister is not content with the maintenance of the Provincial Sanatorium. The Conservative administration had done nothing to relieve the congested conditions at the Sanatorium.

Dr. MacMillan said he had specifically criticized the Sanatorium in his report of the administration. "He criticises us for not spending the money on extra mental treatment, but that is \$3,400 more than he ever spent in his term of office," Mr. McGuigan maintained. "The need was just as great from 1931 to 1935" as the \$7,000 grant for the hospital, he said, was to have been raised by the health tax, and that could not be applied last year.

Mr. McGuigan said it was reported there were 267 active cases of tuberculosis outside the Sanatorium. It will not be possible to give adequate assistance to those who are in need. The government is paying a grant for extra mental treatment, but the number is steadily growing. A report of all these cases is kept on file. The relief committee will try to deal with them in a fair way.

MR. WILLIAM HUGHES Mr. William Hughes, Fifth District of Kings, told the House he would be brief when he rose to participate in the Budget debate.
