KILLED LAST NIGHT BY THE EXPRESS

A Returning Islander Meets Death in Summerside

IDENTITY IS NOT FULLY ESTABLISHED

He Told a Passenger on the Steamer He Had Not Been on the Island for 20 Years and Was Going to Visit His Sister in Coleman. The Latest Information up to Midnight.

SUMMERSIDE, July 12.—(Special.)—

Among the passengers by the Northumberland last night was a man of about 65 years of age carrying a valise and a gun. He got off the boat and possibly not understanding the train arrangements did not wait for the train and walked up the wharf. Apparently he was aware of a west bound train as he altered his course when near the head of wharf and wended his way to the depot. Before he reached the station however, the train for Charlottetown came up to the wharf and after going down the line as usual backed up to the station. Whether the unfortunate traveller was deaf or not is not known as the rear end of the first-class coach struck him near the east end of station, inflicting injuries which caused his death only a few moments after. Information states that his legs and arms were broken and mangled, and his skull fractured.

Tender hands bore the poor fellow to the waiting room where medical aid was summoned, but he was past human treatment.

An investigation of his effects reveals the fact that his name is apparently John L. Weatherbie of New Bedford, Mass. In his valise was found a picture of what seems to be his home. He with some women and children appear in the view

in the foreground. A memo book in his pocket has a large number of addresses of people resident in this Province, many by the name of Lane. Among the number is Isaac Lane of Charlottetown. Deceased told a passenger on the Northumberland that he had not been on the Island for 20 years and was going to Coleman to see his sister. It is thought by those who have seen his memorandum that he is related to the Lanes.

LATER.

The unfortunate man who was killed here this evening is apparently between 65 and 70. He looks like a man who has been doing outside work.

He is well dressed in a suit of black serge with a light black duster. He had some money on his person, consisting of a five dollar bill and \$1.40 in change.

In his pockets were two silver watches of an old style cylinder. On his person was found an I. C. R. return ticket reading Petticoat to Anagnone, No. 55, dated June 26th. He has a lot of other effects in his valise.

LATEST.

A man named Weatherbie says that the man killed is a Weatherbie, although he has not seen him for 20 years. A coroner's inquest will be held to-morrow morning. Mr. Isaac Lane will be asked to go to Summerside by the express this morning to identify the remains.

CITY AND COUNTRY

On or about 5th June, John A. Martin of Stanhope, found a valuable mare shot in his field, apparently placed there after the animal was shot. Mr. Martin came to the city and secured Dr. Leckie, V. S. and after the doctor had made an examination he reported that from the nature of the wounds, the animal had been shot by Mr. Martin and Dr. Leckie traced the marks of the mare's feet to a field owned by John McAuley of the same place. The footprints were measured and found to correspond with the hoof of the animal. After a few days Martin laid information against McAuley before Mr. H. J. Palmer, Stipendiary for Queen's and a summons was issued returnable on Thursday last. Subpoenas were served upon Mrs. Katherine McAuley, (wife) and Mrs. Margaret McAuley, (mother) and an adopted girl named Sadie O'Hanley. On the day of trial the defendant and witnesses failed to appear and a warrant for his arrest was issued. It is understood that McAuley cannot be found.
