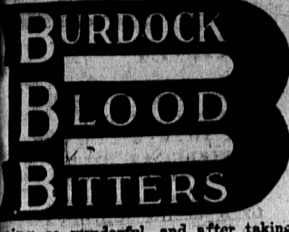

Laurel Marathon is Won by DeMar

BALTIMORE, Md., Mar. 28.—The ancient legs of Clarence DeMar, of Boston, carried the colors of Melrose Post No. 90, American Legion to victory over the Laurel to Baltimore marathon course for the second consecutive time yesterday. DeMar won the national championship over the same course last year.

DeMar covered the 26 mile, 385 yard course in two hours, 43 minutes, 49 4-5 seconds, bettering his time of 2:45 05 1-5 in the National Marathon last year, but endangering neither Frank Zuna's course record of 2:41 39 2-5, nor the world's record of 2:35 40 2-5 hung up at Boston last year by Johnny Mitchell, a sensational young Nova Scotian.

Albert R. (Whitey) Michelson of Cygnet A. C., East Port Chester, Conn., finished second. Frank Zuna, Millrose A. C., New York, was third.

Lloyd George Meets Rowdyism In By-Election

LONDON, Mar. 28.—Organized rowdyism marked the appearance of David Lloyd George, former Premier, on a Liberal platform in North Southward in support of the candidacy of E. A. Strauss, Liberal, in the by-election made necessary by the resignation of Dr. Haden Guest, former Labor member. Dr. Guest is contesting the by-election as an Independent Constitutional. He broke with the Labor party as a consequence of a disagreement over their attitude on the Chinese situation.

A car has been offered from Saskatchewan at extras 29, firsts 27, seconds 24 f.o.b. Montreal dealers are paying for Ontario eggs, extras 30, firsts 28, seconds 24 f.o.b.

WINNIPEG.—This market has taken another drop and dealers are now quoting shippers for ungraded eggs, delivered, extras 24, firsts 22, seconds 21. Receipts are increasing very rapidly and are now quite heavy.

SASKATOON.—Dealers are quoting shippers for ungraded eggs, delivered, extras 24, firsts 22, seconds 21. Receipts are increasing rapidly.

CALGARY.—Storing is expected to become general here during the present week, dealers having reduced their prices to extras 24, firsts 22, seconds 17.

GIRL, 14, RUN 28 1-2 MILES IN 5 HOURS IN TEXAS RACES

AUSTIN Texas, Mar. 28.—Two Tara Humara Indian runners from the mountain wilds of Mexico, yesterday ran 89 miles from San Antonio to Austin in less than 15 hours, a feat that would kill an ordinary horse, and finished apparently as fresh as when they started.

Their endurance was matched by a fourteen-year-old girl of their tribe, who ran 28 1/2 miles and felt so fresh that she insisted on running around the quarter-mile track at the University Stadium several times. The races were features of Texas relay games.

Jose Torres, 38 years old, and Tomas Zarfo, 24, the men, started from San Antonio at 3:19 o'clock in the morning and crossed the finish line in the Stadium at 6:12 last night, making their time for 89.4 miles 14 hours, 53 minutes.

Lota Cuazarre, the girl, finished the 28 1/2 miles in four hours 56 minutes.

Cambridge Scores Over Oxford 'U' in 69th Track Meet

LONDON, Mar. 28.—Cambridge defeated Oxford University in their 69th annual track meet at the Queen Club here Saturday.

The first three of the eleven events on the program, a mile out of 11 contests on the program administered an even more crushing defeat than last year, when the score was 8-3.

The stars of the meet are Lord Burghley, England's champion hurdler, who for the second consecutive year ran away with both hurdle events for Cambridge and 42 feet 2 inches, Robert L. Hyatt, his team mate, J. W. J. Rinkel, who was a double victor, taking the century and quarter mile events.

Cambridge gained an early lead over Oxford. Cambridge took the first three of the eleven events on the program. Only first places count, with each University sending two men into each event. J. Edwards, of Oxford, finished second. W. J. Rinkel, Cambridge won the 100 yard dash in ten seconds flat.

CALGARY MAN AGAIN ELECTED HEAD OF HOCKEY AMATEURS

VANCOUVER, B. C., Mar. 28.—Dr. F. E. Sandercock, of Calgary, was re-elected president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association at the concluding session of the annual meeting here yesterday.
