## Nazis Lost 159,000 Men In Long Battle

LONDON, Feb. 13—(AP)—The shattered remains of Budapest fell to the Red Army today after 49 days of street fighting that cost the enemy 49,000 men killed and 110,000 captured in the greatest individual disaster since Stalingrad, while some 300 miles to the northwest the Russians slashed 10 miles farther westward through German Silesia toward Dresden.

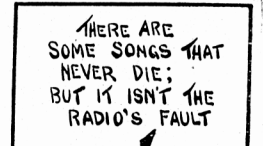
