A favorable reply from the four statesmen—Prime Minister Chamberlain, Chancellor Hitler, Premier Daladier and Premier Mussolini whose Munich accord for the partition of Czechoslovakia expelled Europe's war crisis—would delay Hungary's planned mobilization, he added.

Czechs Rush Troops
 Troops of Hungary and Czechoslovakia are separated only by a narrow strip on the frontier and Czechoslovakia is reinforcing the international bridge across the Danube River.

Military Activity Follows Move
 The troop movements started shortly after Koloman Von Kanya, Hungary's Foreign Minister, read the declaration to the final session of the Hungarian-Czechoslovak conference that Hungary's claims would be given to the four-power conferees for decision.

OBJECTS TO GUN PROBE AS 'POLITICAL'

Clashes Of Counsel
Mark Resumed
Hearing—Judge Adjourns Without Comment.

OTTAWA, Oct. 13—(CP)—Mr. Justice H. H. Davis, Royal Commissioner investigating the Bren Gun contract, adjourned today's sitting here an hour earlier than had been expected following clashes between counsel and a objection by Hon. J. L. Ralston, chief government counsel, to observations from the commission which he said were going "out to the public as conclusions." Col. Ralston said the inquiry was "a political trial."

The judge adjourned the sitting without comment as Major General L. R. Lafeche, deputy minister of National Defence ended his fifth day on the witness stand. General Lafeche had said he was bound by government policy and could not accede to a British Government suggestion the defence department sell Bren guns to Canada on an agency basis.

This was in connection with negotiations leading up to contracts under which the John Inglis Company of Toronto is to make 7,000 Bren light machine guns for the department and 5,000 for the Canadian army.

Lieut. Col. George Drew, Toronto lawyer, in a magazine article led to the appointment of Mr. Justice Davis as Royal Commissioner to review all circumstances surrounding the contract.

When General Lafeche started to describe his conversations with the sub-committee of the interdepartmental committee on munitions contracts in January and February, 1938, Mr. Justice Davis stopped him.

"I am not at all impressed by this sub-committee," he declared. "But I hold the strongest possible views as to what was the duty of the interdepartmental committee." He was not interested in what members of the sub-committee did, believing that the interdepartmental committee, set up by the government for a certain purpose, should take the full responsibility. Col. Ralston protested the commissioner should not make such observations at this stage unless he was prepared to hear argument by counsel at once. "It would be quite correct if your Lordship was sitting on an appeal," Col. Ralston said, "but when your Lordship makes such views known in this case they go out to the public as conclusions, and I am sure your Lordship holds an open mind."

Political Trial
 "This is a political trial. It is being tried in the newspapers and in the public. I think we should keep our minds open and not express views which go out to the newspapers as conclusions and become subjects for editorials."

Negro Is Victim Of Lynching Mob

RUSTON, La., Oct. 13—(AP)—W. C. Williams, 16-year-old Negro suspect in the slaying of R. M. Blair and the beating of his woman companion, was lynched today by a mob of several hundred white men.

The fatal attack occurred Tuesday night at a parking spot near here and was one of a series of similar crimes.

Adjoins Hearing
 As a hot interchange arose over this observation Mr. Justice Davis, who had earlier declared the commission would sit until five o'clock today, suddenly adjourned the hearing until tomorrow morning. The session had proceeded only a few minutes past the regular closing hour of 4:30.

Desire of the British war office to purchase Bren guns from or through the Canadian department of national defence ran counter to the settled policy of the government of Canada, according to General Lafeche's testimony.

Messages exchanged between London and Ottawa and filed today showed the British government would supply 5,000 guns made in Canada to the war office on an agency basis.

Sir Harold Brown, director of munitions production, in a cabled answer to a query from the committee asked General Lafeche to affirm officially that a contract under which Canada would supply guns on an agency basis would not be accepted.

At the same time a cable from Canada house stated Sir Harold wanted to know why it was necessary for the United Kingdom to negotiate a separate contract with the Inglis company.

The reply indicated the Canadian policy by which General Lafeche said he was bound. It stated the position of the Canadian government had been made clear at the Imperial conference and that the government preferred the British government should deal directly with Canadian contractors.

In the exchange of messages in February it was stated in a suggestion from the interdepartmental committee that alternative tenders from firms other than the Inglis company should be obtained. He stated several months would be required for another firm to study the job before making a reasonable tender and this delay would not tend to prejudice the interest in the scheme.
