Bright Spots Of The Week

TORONTO. Atlas Plywood Corporation of the United States will establish a branch factory here and will be operating about June 1.

THREE RIVERS, Que.—St. Lawrence Paper Company has increased wages of all employees 10 per cent, retroactive to May 1.

HAMILTON, Ont.—Burlington Refineries Limited producing motor oil and gasoline, began operations in their new plant here this week.

MILTON, Ont.—The Milton Brock Company re-opened its plant here this week effecting an improvement in the local employment situation.

MONTREAL.—Permit has been issued to the Dominion Glass Company, Limited to erect a \$100,000 addition to their plant here.

FERRIS, Ont.—Beatty Bros Limited here have added 85 to their payroll since last September. Other local plants report business expansion.

QUEBEC.—A six percent wage increase was announced here this week for employees of the Anglo Pulp and Paper Mills.

FORT ERIE, Ont.—Total on relief at Fort Erie has been cut from 1000 to about 400 in the last two months by demand for labor on new projects.

OTTAWA.—Building permits in 6 cities issued in April were up \$600,000 over the figures for the corresponding month of last year.

Against Exaggerated Gold Values

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
HALIFAX, May 18.—"Far too much enthusiasm has been shown in Nova Scotia for 'get rich quick ideas' in gold mining," Professor G. V. Douglas, M.C., M.Sc., F.G.S., of the Department of Geology at Dalhousie University declared here today.

Prof. Douglas said he held no brief for "flashy little mines that soon petered out," he said in an address before a service club. "Money is made in finding a consistent body of gold in a mass of ore that ensures consistent operation, month after month," the geologist asserted.

Prospects for gold mining in Nova Scotia were bright if handled correctly, he believed. "You have here a number of deposits that will pay. But they need guidance," Prof. Douglas declared.

The Professor added a word of criticism. "In the past you have had too many 'straw bosses' coming down from the north country. Instead, what were needed, he claimed, were qualified mining men acquainted with the physical characteristics of the province and the nature of its gold mining.

It was his opinion that the price of gold would not rise much more, because of this belief, he said he was "definitely against opening up of mines on exaggerated ideas of gold values."

Nut Wafers Chocolate

Here is a nice mixture for little chocolate wafers, which spread quite thin while baking—wafers with the added interest of walnuts in them. They are sufficiently rich to be attractive enough for the quite special occasion, yet neither too troublesome or expensive to make in generous amounts for family use.

- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 2 beaten eggs
- 2 squares (2 ounces) chocolate
- 1 cup chopped walnut meats
- 2-3 cup pastry flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon vanilla

Cream shortening and add sugar gradually. Cream all the while. Add well-beaten eggs. Melted chocolate, nuts, flour, salt and vanilla. Drop from a teaspoon on to a greased baking sheet about 2 inches apart and bake in hot oven for 10 to 12 minutes.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. HUGH NICHOLSON

On Thursday, April 5th, Mr. Hugh Nicholson, a very highly esteemed resident of Glen Valley, passed peacefully away in the Prince County Hospital, Summerside, at the age of 62 years. The deceased had been in a poor condition of health the greater part of the year and had been in the Prince County Hospital most of that time.

When Mr. Nicholson entered the Hospital, it was hoped that his case was not at all serious. But as time went on it became evident that recovery was impossible. All that medical skill and kind friends could do was done, but all to no avail. On the above mentioned date his gentle spirit winged its heavenward flight.

Besides a sorrowing widow, the deceased leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving father, three sons and two daughters. His sons are: John D. Nicholson, Dryden, Ontario; Norman Nicholson, C. N. Railway, Charlottetown; and Wilfred Nicholson, at home and the daughters are Mrs. Donald McDonald, Brookfield, and Mrs. Hedley McPherson, Glen Valley. Mr. and Mrs. Angus Nicholson, who came out from Scotland quite a few years ago. In their family there were seven brothers and four sisters. The brothers who survive Mr. Nicholson, Westport, Canada; Daniel Nicholson, Boston; James Nicholson, Montreal; and Alexander Nicholson, Wisconsin. Two other brothers, John Nicholson and William Nicholson, passed away some years ago. John had reached the age of 90 years and William the age of 16 years. The four sisters are Mrs. Flora McLeod, Sydney, N.S.; Mrs. Malcolm Buchanan, Bradalbane; Mrs. Isaac Sharp, Pleasant Valley, and Mrs. Norman McPherson, Montague.

Two of their sisters predeceased their brother Hugh by a number of years, namely, Mrs. Isaac Sharp and Mrs. Norman McPherson. Mr. Nicholson was a man who was quite widely and favorably known. Having travelled considerably throughout Canada and the United States, he had met a large number of friends. Some twenty-five years ago he became a member of the Canadian Order of Foresters and he has been a member of the Orange Order since his early manhood years. In both of these orders he was held in high esteem by his many brethren. They and all others who came to know him will henceforth miss his genial presence. But while many in the outside world will miss him it is in the home that his loss will be felt most keenly. With his bright and cheerful manner, he there made life pleasant for all. In his absence his loved ones will spend many lonely hours. While in the hospital his suffering which at times was very intense, was borne in a spirit of heroic calmness. He did not murmur nor complain. For some time previous he realized that the end could not be far away. And yet in the face of all of the odds against him, he remained calm and unmoved. He knew "in Whom he had believed and he was persuaded that He was able to keep what He had committed to His trust against that day." His passing was one of sweet peace.

The funeral, which was a very large one was held on the afternoon of Saturday, April 7th. The service was conducted by Rev. J. R. Wallis, assisted by Rev. R. Hensley Stavert. A eulogy entitled "Does Jesus Care?" was very beautifully rendered by Rev. and Mrs. J. R. Wallis. The floral tributes were very fine indeed, and consisted of the following: Pillbox, the family; wreath, Mrs. Flora McLeod and family; crescent, C. N. Railway Office staff; potted plant, Mrs. Benj. Sharp and Mrs. Jessie Sherman, and just here it would be fitting to add that these last two mentioned ladies were very kind indeed to the family during his illness. Mrs. Nicholson and family are very grateful to them for their great kindness. The pall bearers were: Messrs. Dougald McPherson, Stirling McLean, Chas. McKenna, Harry Weeks, Thomas Wigmore and Malcolm Buchanan.

Interment was in the Presbyterian Cemetery, Hartsville.
