Then what happened? The leader of the Government left the city for his Easter holidays—as he had a perfect right to do: I am not criticising him for that—and apparently another move took place. We have another name appearing in connection with this matter—Mr. Campbell. We have an interview between Mr. Campbell and some of the teachers, and the result is that the objection on the part of the Government to an independent commission is withdrawn. The leader of the Government and the Government say: "We will not give you an independent commission." Mr. Campbell comes along and says: "We will; the Government must give you an independent commission." The flat goes forth; the say-so of Mr. Campbell is accepted as the master of this administration. He is the man who dictates and he carries his point against these hon. gentlemen! I would suggest that the leader of the Government and he should exchange places. And I shall give you a few more reasons for my suggestion before I am through.

THE LEADER IN THE REAR Then, the negotiations having been completed—they say on Sunday—my hon. friend from West River (Hon. Mr. LePage) is trotted out as the representative of the Government to formally put through and announce to the public what had previously

been agreed upon. There is the situation, and it is anything but creditable to this Government. I have mentioned Mr. Campbell's name, and I shall have to mention it again. I was very much amused at an answer to a question given by the leader of the Government the other day. He was asked about the consolidation of the statutes of the Province; if they were being consolidated and on what terms. And the answer was that they were being consolidated by Mr. Campbell, "assisted by the undersigned." The "undersigned," Mr. Speaker, was the leader of the Government! (laughter). That is an index of what is going on all round. Mr. Campbell, "assisted by the leader of the Government," is carrying on the Government, apparently. (Loud laughter and applause.)

Mr. Stewart then went on to deal fully and convincingly with the question of provincial subsidies, pointing out the course which should have been adopted by Premier Saunders at the inter-provincial conference of 1927, when he had the opportunity of presenting these claims in the manner recommended by the Duncan Commission. He reviewed also the vague announcement recently given by the Premier as to the meeting of a committee of experts some time next fall. A full report of Mr. Stewart's remarks on this important question will appear later. After passing into an able discussion of the public accounts, agriculture and public works, the Conservative leader adjourned the debate at 6 o'clock, the House adjourning until 10 a. m. today.

said Louis Trainor and the amount of money received for same by the said Louis Trainor approved by the Highway Superintendent of the District in which it was performed. Hon. J. P. MacIntyre said the blue books didn't show the name of any Louis Trainor of Waterville. Mr. W. Chester S. McLure asked the Honourable Premier the following: 1. Is it the intention of the Government to establish the Old Age Pensions Act in the Province. 2. What action has the Government taken in the matter to ascertain the cost to this Province in the establishing of the Act? 3. Table all correspondence with the Federal Government on Old Age Pensions Act, if any. The Premier said he had no answers ready yet for the questions asked yesterday.

Dr. A. A. MacDonald asked the Hon. Leader of the Government: Give itemized statement of expenditure of \$1400 for Teachers Summer Course as shown on Part 3 Page 7 of Report of Provincial Auditor 1928. The Premier tabled the answer which was as follows: Amounts paid on account of Summer Courses: Prof. J. H. Blanchard, \$350. Prof. J. D. Steele, \$300. Prof. J. G. Bennett, \$300. Seven public school inspectors, board, tuition and registration, Mt. Allison University, \$450. Total \$1400.

Dr. A. A. MacDonald asked the Hon. Leader of the Government: 1. Give items of the following amounts as shown on Part 3 Page 3 of the report of the Provincial Auditor 1928: Supreme Court Expenses, Hilary Term 1927—\$1885.67. Supreme Court Expenses, Trinity Term, 1928—\$1768.90. Supreme Court Expenses, November Term, 1928—\$65.50. The Premier tabled the answer, which was as follows: Supreme Court Expenses: Hilary Term: Grand Jurors ... 17.50 Petit Jurors ... 1,183.88 Crown Witnesses ... 167.50 Sheriff ... 460.84 Miscellaneous ... 56.15 1,865.67

Trinity Term: Grand Jurors ... 22.64 Petit Jurors ... 976.28 Crown Witnesses ... 409.20 Sheriff and Bailiffs ... 305.13 Miscellaneous ... 53.65 \$1,768.90

A petition for the incorporation of the Prince Edward Island Telephone Company was handed in by the Premier and dealt with in the customary manner. A bill embodying its provisions was introduced by Mr. Saunders, and was read the first

time. An act to amend the Prince Edward Island Fish and Game Protection Act, 1928 received its first reading, as did also "an act to incorporate the Provincial Sanatorium." The House then resolved itself into the committee of the whole to take into consideration the following resolution: Resolved that a plebiscite relating to the control and suppression of traffic in alcoholic liquors be submitted to qualified electors of the Province in the month of July A.D., 1929, on a ballot containing the following questions: 1. Are you in favor of the Prohibition Act as now in force in this Province? 2. Are you in favor of the sale as a beverage of beer and spirituous liquor in sealed packages under Government Control? Hon. J. D. Stewart: "What is the purpose of this? Is it necessary to make a resolution in order to take a plebiscite?" Hon. J. D. Stewart inquired if, in the Liberal platform in 1927, the terms were set forth in the same words as in the resolution. The Premier replied that the phraseology was not quite the same, but the meaning was. He said that the question as it was in the platform of 1927 was "Are you in favor of Government Control as it is in the Province of Ontario?" Mr. Arsenault: "I have a copy of the questions as taken from your platform. The first was 'Are you in favor of retaining the prohibition act.' That is not the same as this question, which reads 'Are you in favor of the prohibition act, as now enforced in this province.'" Premier Saunders: "What is the difference?" Hon. J. D. Stewart: "If there is no difference why not leave it as it was?" Mr. W. C. S. McLure thought that the date of the plebiscite should be named. It would be most undesirable to have it fall on a holiday. After discussion, Mr. Speaker took the chair, and the resolution was reported approved of. The Premier introduced a bill embodying its provisions which received its first reading.

Hon. J. P. MacIntyre moved that John J. MacAdam be appointed doorkeeper. The motion was agreed to. On motion of Mr. Mustard, the bill entitled an act to incorporate the Presbyterian Church at Tyne Valley be read a third time. This was accordingly done, and the bill was passed.

An act for the prevention of frauds in connection with the sale of securities received its third reading, and was declared passed. An act to amend an act to consolidate and amend the incorporation act of the Protestant Orphanage was then taken into consideration by the House in committee of the whole, and having been approved, was, on motion, ordered to be engrossed and read a third time tomorrow.

The House, on motion of the Premier, then went into committee of the whole to consider supply. Hon. J. D. Stewart continued his address, and at 6 o'clock adjourned the debate. The House adjourned to meet today at 10 o'clock.
