There were four cases of Breach of Motor Vehicle Act, two being fined \$10 each and two \$2 each. One case of larceny was dismissed. Yesterday before the Stipendiary Magistrate more cases were disposed of, as follows: One breach of Inland Revenue Act, adjourned till Monday; one breach of prohibition act fined \$200 or three months. Two men were arrested for running a gambling game on the square at night were dismissed. One woman was fined \$20 or thirty days for being drunk. Her sentence was suspended pending good behavior.

Bomb Plot Frustrated In Ireland

LONDON, Sept. 29.—Scotland Yard frustrated a plot to blow up the Irish office and treasury building here, a Scotland official declared today. He said the Sinn Feiner and Bolshevik planned the explosion as reprisal for police activity against them. Irish planned to send taxi cabs loaded with high explosives into the street before the two buildings. After the explosion was declared it was planned to have a large body of armed men rush into the district and inflict much damage and if possible escape in the confusion which was certainly to follow. The official said a number of secret arrests had been made. A number of others were implicated. He said the ringleaders it was admitted are unknown yet.
