We hadn't enough money in the world to pay them, and I blushed as I noted that the greater part of the bills were personal outgoings.

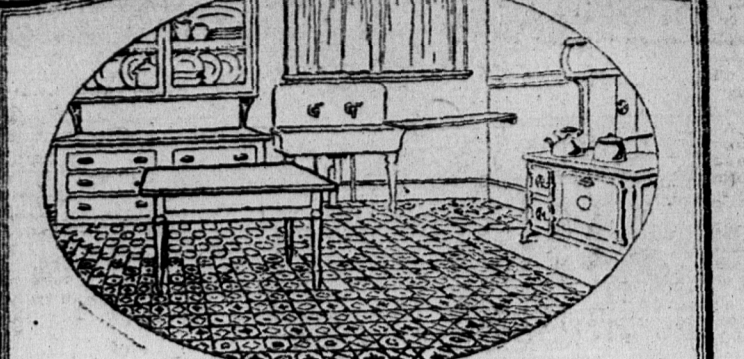

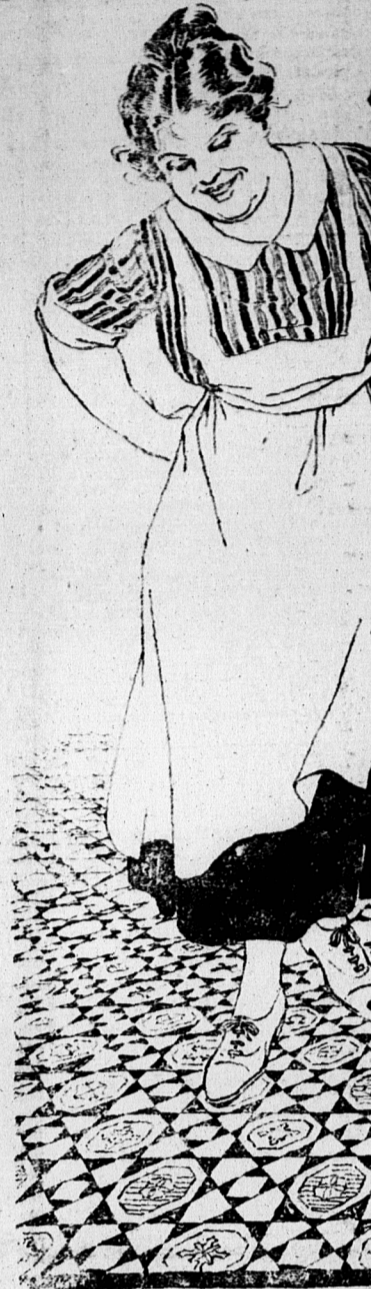

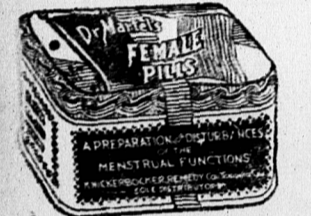

Hints for the Motorist

NOT ENOUGH GAS AT OPEN THROTTLE

O. M. C. writes:—My car has a carburetor and when I start up and open the throttle, the engine begins to misfire and will nearly stop unless I pull the choke half way out and hold it there. This carburetor has been taken apart and pronounced all right. Fuel line is clear. What is the matter?

Answer:—This carburetor has a main jet and a compensating jet and the engine runs almost entirely on the main jet, when the throttle is open. This main jet has no adjustment and there can be no trouble with it unless the supply of gasoline to it is restricted. The only thing likely to do this is the clogging of the filter screen, located where gasoline enters the float-chamber. You better see for yourself that this is clear. For very heavy gasoline a larger main jet is sometimes required and the size of jet is changeable. Does gasoline stand at a high enough level in the float-chamber? Have you got your hot-air connection on the carburetor air? This poor gasoline needs lots of heat to vaporize it.

TUNGSTEN LAMPS IN CHARGING BANK

J. D. M. writes:—I have a lamp tank for battery charging on 32 1/2 farm lighting current and cannot get carbon lamps to use it. In using tungsten lamps how many watts of lamp capacity would be equivalent to one ampere of current? How many watts are required for a carbon lamp and a tungsten lamp of the same candle-power, what difference would there be in the current passing through them?

Answer:—The number of watts divided by the voltage gives the current. For instance, a 40 watt, 52 volt lamp passes slightly over one ampere. The ordinary (evacuated) tungsten lamps give one rated candle power for each 1.25 watts approximately and the gas filled tungsten lamps one candle-power for each 0.7 watts approximately. Evacuated tungsten lamps require about one-third as much current as

SPEED AND FUEL ECONOMY

P. C. K. asks:—Does it take any more gas to run fast over a certain road than it does to run over it slowly?

Answer:—Yes, if you run very fast. Either extreme of speed is uneconomical. If the speed is very low, the engine is low, while if speed is very high, the resistance to car motion becomes so great that an excess of fuel is consumed. The economical speed range differs with differing car designs, large powerful cars having higher efficient speeds than small, low powered ones, as a rule. There is not much exact data on this subject, but it is generally considered that, for the usual run of cars, speed between 15 and 25 miles per hour secure the greatest mileage for the fuel used.
