One of the older pupils with a dainty basket in her hand stood on the stage while the children marched up to music and trippingly passed her dropped their tokens into her basket to the song "Hear the Pennies Dropping in." Lionel Teris, Beethoven's fourth piano concerto in G, played by the Leeds pianist, Miss Dorothy Hesse, and Rachmaninoff's second piano concerto played by Nicholas Orloff. The usual Saturday night Wagner excerpts will at this festival be taken from Die Meistersinger.

Sir Thomas Beecham will be conductor-in-chief of the festival, but Dr. Malcolm Sargent will conduct Bach's Mass in B minor. The vocalists include Miss Stiles-Allen (in Handel and Delius), Miss Elsie Sudaby (in Bach and Wagner), and Miss Astra Desmond (in Cherubini and Walton) and Miss Muriel Brunskill (in Delius, Bach, and Wagner), contraltos, Walter Widdop (in Handel and Wagner), and Hubert Eisdel (in the B minor Mass and Wagner), tenors, Keith Falkner (in Handel, Delius, and Bach), Horace Stevens (in Cherubini and Wagner), and Dennis Noble (in Walton and Bach), basses.

**Leed's Big Festival of Wonderful Music**

LEEDS, Eng., April 12—The main interest in the Leeds Triennial Musical Festival, which will be held in Leeds Town Hall from October 7 to October 10 next, will be in large-scale choral works, according to the prospectus recently issued, though there is to be no dearth of orchestral music nor lack of variety in the choice of periods, composers, and styles.

Four Masses, but as unlike in character as things bearing the same name would be, are to be given, one on each day of the festival—Cherubini's Mass in D minor, Delius's Mass of Life, Bach's Mass in B minor, and Berlioz's Messe des Morts, Handel will be represented by Solomon in St. Thomas Beecham's version which will begin the festival. Bach has besides the Mass the double concerto for violins, which will be played by Albert Sammons and Miss Isolda Menges, the well-known "Jesus, Joy of man's desiring," and Wachtel auf. Three new choral works will be heard for the first time—Frederick Austin's Pervigilium Veneris, Eric Fogg's The Seasons, and William Walton's Belshazzar's Feast. The unaccompanied choral music consists of Brahms's Fest and Gedenksprache, a series of three motets written for performance at Hamburg in 1890 on the occasion of his receiving the honorary citizenship of his native city, and four of Parry's great cycle "Songs of Farewell." No choral work of Elgar's is included, presumably in order to avoid poaching on the preserves of the Three Choirs Festival, but his violoncello concerto is to be played by Antoni Sala. Vaughan Williams's Toward the Unknown Region, which was written for the Leeds Festival of 1907, is to be revived.

PERTH, N. B., April 10—Fenwick Jamer, of Four Falls, was found this morning shot through the head and an automatic 32 lying beside him in the hay mow, of his barn a short distance from the farm house. The victim, who was in good health, arose early this morning and went to the barn about 6.30 o'clock. His wife went to see what was keeping him and was horrified to find him lying in the hay-mow shot through the head and the automatic at his side. Senior Constable Stewart of the Provincial Police was notified and he at once left for the scene of the tragedy with Dr. A. F. McIntosh, of Perth the Coroner, who took charge of the case.

The late Mr. Jamer was 63 years of age. He was married last fall and with his wife took up residence at Four Falls where the tragedy occurred. No reason for the act can be ascertained. He is survived by his wife, four brothers and four sisters.

He says: "Miss Forbes-Robertson's performance, as all her performances are, is a surprise. What she has seen in the play is a terrible and ruinous experience. She traces all the evident motives for Hedda's behavior—her jealousy of Mrs. Elvsted, her contempt of Tesman, her lust for power. Then, perceiving that they need some deeper force to give them the unity of a masterpiece and to save them from being tinged with ridicule by Ibsen's emphasis on his
