A VERY GREATLY CHANGED SITUATION.

It must be apparent to all that the recent Dominion election has changed the situation in many respects, international, Imperial and provincial as well as federal. Without touching minor matters for the present, it is sufficiently apparent that in returning Mr. Borden to power, the people of Canada have endorsed his protectionist and imperial policy. He is more frankly protectionist, more pronouncedly imperial than Sir Wilfrid Laurier. His victory will give new hope and courage to the so-called tariff reformers in England, and to those throughout the Empire who favor drawing closer the bonds between the United Kingdom and the over-sea Dominions.

As to the United States, the rejection by Canada of this policy of reciprocity carries with it a chill for the delusive hopes of any on that side of the line that Canada might be enticed into political union. The impossibility of such union has been as firmly asserted as the policy of closer consolidation for the Empire has been. It remains to be seen whether or not the United States will now, or in the near future reduce its tariff on the natural products of Canada as had been confidently predicted would be the case if reciprocity was rejected. However that may turn out, it is quite clear that our relations to the Mother Country and to the United States must be profoundly affected by the verdict given on Thursday last.

Coming to the Dominion itself, the changes resulting from the elections will be sweeping and various. Power and patronage and the control of legislation; the projecting and construction of public works, have passed from the hands of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues to the hands of Mr. Borden and his colleagues. Every portfolio in the Government passes to new hands. Appointments of Governors, Judges, Senators, High Commissioners, Trade and Immigration Agents all about the world will be under Conservative control. Mr. McDonald of Pictou will no longer dispense the patronage of the winter steamers. Supplies for the railway, the marine service, hardware, coal, groceries, uniforms, printing, will no longer be made by the favored ones of fifteen years past.

It has been a favorite contention of some of the Liberal organs for years past that it was useless to elect Op-

position members, because they could get little or nothing for their counties. And now Mr. Richards and Mr. Hughes are in opposition to the Government shortly coming to power. According to the limping logic of their press supporters, it must have been a mistake to elect them! The shallowness of such logic, often referred to in these columns, was extended to cover the supposed importance of keeping the Provincial Government of the same stripe as the party in power at Ottawa. This ill-fledged chicken also now comes home to roost. Applied to the present situation it can only mean that the usefulness of a Liberal Government in this Province is gone.

False standards set up by a party in power are of necessity severely tested when the once dominant party is relegated to the shades of opposition and the other party obtains the seals of office. But it is a poor rule that will not work both ways. For fifteen years past a defeated Liberal candidate had more power than his elected opponent. He controlled and dispensed the federal patronage within his county and assisted in disposing of the higher federal offices in the Province. Now it follows inevitably and fairly enough that Mr. Murphy in Prince and Mr. Fraser in Kings will be the dispensers of the patronage west and east for years to come.

To the many of both parties who along with The Guardian have believed that as a rule Governments have been kept in power too long, the change will not be unwelcome. Mr. Borden is fairly committed to place our greatly neglected transportation on a satisfactory footing both as to continuous communication and a reasonable through rate. The policy he has laid down in another matter commends itself to our judgment. He proposes, out of the abundant revenues of the Dominion to aid the Provinces in road-making and in agriculture. In no Province of Canada will such aid be more welcome than in Prince Edward Island. In the carrying out of these pledges and proposals, if done in good faith as we believe it will be, Mr. Borden will have the support and endorsement of the large majority of the people of this Province.

The political situation has changed greatly as we have said, but so far as this Province is concerned the change in some respects must be for the better rather than the worse.

SIR WILFRID LAURIER.

It is announced from Montreal that Sir Wilfrid Laurier will, for a time at least, continue to lead the Liberal party in Parliament. This will accord with the ardent wishes of his lieutenants and supporters throughout the Dominion. He had during the late campaign affirmed his determination to retire from political life if his party were beaten, but he did not at that time anticipate that his party could possibly meet with such disastrous shipwreck as has now become apparent.

That he shall remain at the head of the party for at least a year or two seems to be imperatively necessary to his party and desirable for the Dominion. Next to a strong Government it is most desirable that the Opposi-

tion shall be alert, vigilant and ably led. Sir Wilfrid, whose personal life has been so blameless has taken no stain from his defeat. He knows Canadian affairs most thoroughly and under his leadership the Opposition may be counted upon to do its legitimate work faithfully and along broad lines of useful public policy, free from factious negation.

REVISES RETURNS SHOW BORDEN'S MAJORITY 44

MONTREAL, Sept. 25—The following is the standing of parties according to latest returns: Conservatives, 144, Liberals 86, Nationalists 17, Conservative majority over all 10. Total majority over the Liberals 44. The deferred elections are in Gaspe and Chicoutimi-Saguenay, Quebec, in Thunder Bay, Ontario, and in Yukon.

Latest returns in Quebec show that Bellechasse has gone Conservative. In Ontario, East Algoma seems to be Conservative, though all the returns are not in yet.

In Saskatchewan, Qu'Appelle and Saskatchewan reported Conservative have returned Liberals.

In the former constituency Mr. Lake Conservative was beaten.

In McLeod (Alta) Perron, Conservative, is now reported beaten leaving the only Conservative Bennet, Calgary in the Province.
