MP. STRESSES NEED FOR MATERNITY AIDS

LONDON, Nov. 21 - (CP) - If successful prosecution of the war had depended on the relief of women in childbirth, ways and means would have been found within a month. Dr. Edith Sumner, Minister of Health, said today.

She stressed the need for antiseptics during childbirth and said, "This meeting is an anachronism. It is more than 100 years ago since a woman was given an anaesthetic in confinement, and yet here we are at the beginning of an atomic age, having to plead that a simple footstool apparatus should be made available to women to ease the indescribable agony of childbirth."

"Human brains devise ingenious inventions but find difficulty in applying them in the interests of the people. Unfortunately the 600,000 women who suffer yearly are unorganized and inarticulate."

Verbal Spat Over Gov't Sale of Fairmiles

OTTAWA, Nov. 21 - (CP) - Reconstruction Minister Howe and Progressive Conservative members engaged in a verbal spat in the Commons yesterday when the subject of the sale of surplus ships cropped up during debate on Munitions and Supply estimates.

Under heavy fire from Opposition benches was W. A. Asse's Corporation's handling of the sale of more than 50 Fairmiles in Eastern Canada and 13 in Western Canada, and the amount of a commission paid to a New York broker for the sale of ships to the French government.

The argument ended with Mr. Howe promising to consider a suggestion of John Diefenbaker (PC-Lake Centre) that the War Assets Corporation should be directed to sell under reasonable circumstances to the highest bidder and that the things it had for sale which could be offered by public auction should be sold at public auction.

Figures prepared for him by his department showed that the American ship brokerage firm of New York had received a commission of \$4,000 for each of 10 ships sold to the French government and for one to the Swedish government.

After questioning by J. M. Macdonald (PC-Muskoka-Cantara) Mr. Howe said he was sure the figure was wrong and he would set the correct one later.

Howe's Statement

Mr. Howe said Fairmiles declared surplus at Sorel, Que., were sold. The terms of sale provided that the ships were to be sold to the buyer, the Corporation would receive additional payments of \$4,000 to the end of 1947; \$2,850 to the end of 1948; \$1,750 to the end of 1949; \$700 to the end of 1950.

Buyers of five boats already had fulfilled this undertaking and have paid the additional amount of \$4,000 on each ship.

The Fairmiles were advertised for sale in the principal newspapers in Canada from August 21 to the middle of September and no sales were made until the middle of the latter month. Canadian shipbuilders had built the ships, represented by their Fairmiles association, had declined to take the ships even on consignment.

War Assets was faced with disposing of the ships or making most expenditures for proceeding to boats during the winter months at Sorel, for these reasons the price of the boats at Sorel was set at \$2,000.

Mr. Howe said it was felt that it would be difficult to put a price of \$2,000 for Fairmiles sold in the St. Lawrence and a higher price on Fairmiles sold on the west coast.

"I say that perhaps they could have been treated as a separate problem. The Fairmiles were more useful on the West Coast than on the East Coast and if we were doing it again we would have treated them as separate ships and advertised separately."

The speaker in the Chamber grew noisy when Mr. Diefenbaker said that Mr. Howe had stated in the Commons yesterday that it might have been possible to save \$1,000,000 in expenditures but that was \$1,000,000.

LONDON, Nov. 21 - (CP) - The National Anthem, "God Save the King," attained its bicentenary Sept. 26, 200 years after it was first performed officially in Drury Lane theatre.

The musical setting for that performance was arranged by Dr. Arne, musical director of the theatre, but is known to have been based on an earlier tune, probably the work of Dr. John Bull, an early organist of the Chapel Royal.

Claims for the composition have also been made on behalf of Henry Carey, who is believed to have arranged a setting for the birthday of George II in 1740.
