Prospects Said Bright For Farm Crops

The outlook for farm crops in the Province this season is much better than it has been for the past few years according to Agriculture experts. An increase in the quality and quantity of almost every crop is expected.

feed. The Experimental Farm has already sold all of its supply of this seed. A heavy increase in the barley crop is expected this year, as farmers are increasing their number of hogs.

Pastures in the Garden Province give promise of producing much more feed per acre than formerly and as a result the livestock of the Island will be greatly benefited.

Although there has been an increase in the price of fertilizer, nevertheless indications point to an increase in this year's potato acreage. Farmers have signified their intentions of increasing this crop by purchasing more seed than they did last spring.

Farmers seem content to grow the same seed potatoes as in former years and as a result the 4,000 bushels of Foundation Stock which were offered for sale met with very slow movement.

The early spring augurs well for the corn crop and other soiling crops which are used for feed for the livestock of the Province.

And so it is all along the line with the 1940 crop prospect the best in a long time. Canada's Agricultural Province, which is often called the "Million Acre Farm" has a bright outlook for the basic industry of the Province.

Quite an improvement in the preparation of seed grain over other years has been noted. Clearing plants to reap they have handled more seed than in previous years and this augurs well for the quality of the seed planted this year.

There has been a heavy demand for barley seed this spring, and the crop will be used mostly for hog

Veteran Newsmen Dies At Winnipeg

WINNIPEG, May 7 - (CP) - Funeral services will be held here Thursday for Alfred Emison McGinley, 60, veteran newspaperman and dramatic critic for the Winnipeg Tribune who died following a heart seizure last night. Native of Saint John, N. B., Mr. McGinley started his newspaper career 37 years ago on the former Saint John Standard after graduating from the University of New Brunswick. Before leaving the Standard, he rose to the post of editor-in-chief.

Before coming west in 1925, he was a member of the press gallery at Ottawa and worked at intervals on the Ottawa Journal, Montreal Star and the former London Advertiser. cept for a brief period as a member of the Edmonton Bulletin staff in 1929, he had been employed with the Tribune since coming to western Canada. For a time he was correspondent for the London Daily Express in the west.
