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Memorials Speak of Famous Deeds

OTTAWA, Jan. 28 (CP)—Statesmen, soldiers, historians, fur-traders and fur-breeders had their labors for Canada honored in historic sites recently marked by the National Parks Bureau. Sites are marked in recommendation of the Historic Sites and Monuments Board of Canada.

On the Alberton-Elmsdale Highway in Prince Edward Island, a cut-stone monument commemorates the work of Robert T. Oulton and Charles W. Alexander, becoming and raising silver black foxes in captivity, and of James Gordon and Robert Tullin who later assisted in developing the industry.

In the Law Courts Building, Halifax, a tablet was installed in memory of William Alexander Henry, one of the Fathers of Confederation, and in the Public Archives Building of the same city is a tablet in memory of William Henry Chase who gave his native province the building where the tablet is placed.

Tablets in memory of Samuel George William Archibald, member of the Nova Scotia Assembly from 1841, and Sir William George Archibald, another Father of Confederation, have been placed in the court house at Truro, N.S.

Commemorating the service of Sir John Joseph Caldwell Abbott, first Canadian-born prime minister, there is a tablet in the Post Office building at St. Andrews, Que.

A boulder and tablet were erected at the house at St. Lins, Laurentides, Que., where the William Henry Archibald was born. The house and surrounding property were acquired by the Dominion government in 1927 and suitable furnishings obtained.

At Kingston, Ont., a tablet was affixed to the Murney Tower, built in 1846 by the British government for the defence of the Kingston Harbor. At Merrickville, Ont., a tablet was placed on a stone block-house built in 1827 for defence of the Rideau Canal.

The names of those who fell in the execution of the Queenston Heights, Oct. 13, 1812, appear on a tablet attached to the General Brock Monument. Those who gave their lives in the Dominion battle of the war of 1812—at Stony Creek, June 6, 1812—are honored by a tablet placed on the Stony Creek Monument.

A tablet honoring Douglas Brymner, first Dominion archivist, has been placed in the Dominion Archives building at Ottawa.

Site of the fur-trading post at Rocky Mountain House, Alta., was acquired and a tablet affixed to what is left of one of the original buildings.

Sir Richard McBride, British Columbia premier from 1903 until 1915, is honored by a tablet placed in the Sir Richard McBride public school at New Westminster, B.C.

Phil Watson Out with Knee injury

NEW YORK, Jan. 29 (CP)—New York Rangers, Stanley Cup winners last spring but now bogged down in the National Hockey League's first place today suffered a severe blow when it was discovered that Phil Watson, fiery center, will be out of action for at least a month with an injured knee.

Watson, who came to Rangers from Montreal Royals, was hurt in Chicago on Sunday but the extent of the injury was not determined until he entered Polytechnic Hospital here for an x-ray examination. Club doctors found a torn cartilage in the right knee. They wanted to operate but Watson would not consent, club officials said, because an operation would have kept him inactive for the entire season.

It was then decided to place the knee in a cast and Watson himself and Coach Frank Boucher expressed hope the center will be back in action before the play-offs roll around the latter half of March.

Rangers suffered a double loss in the injury, because it broke up a high-scoring line of Watson, Dutch Hiller and Bryan Hextall at a time when the club hoped to start a drive for a higher place in the standing. Rangers fell behind in the standings after early season injuries to Art Coulter and Alex Shubicky put it off form.

Boucher said that as Rangers do not play again until Sunday night, when Montreal Canadiens come here, he will not make up his mind for a day or two as to how he will arrange his lines. He expected to bring up a forward from Philadelphia Ramblers.

"Mighty Mite" Re-instated

MIDLAND, Ont., Jan. 29 (CP)—Aurel Joliat, known as the "Mighty Mite" in his 16 seasons with Montreal's National Hockey League Canadiens, has been reinstated to amateur ranks, George S. Dudley, president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, said today.

"It is with pleasure I see Joliat back in the amateur ranks," said Dudley. "His name is one that ranks with the greats of the early days and he has always been a credit to the sport."

Dudley also announced that Basil Doran, formerly of Toronto Maple Leafs and several minor pro teams, and Eddie Ambrose, once with Providence Reds of the American Hockey League, had been re-instated.

Nazi bombs Destroy "Y" Birthplace

LONDON, Jan. 29 (CP)—German bombs have destroyed the birthplace of the Y.M.C.A. The little bedroom which had been the mecca for thousands of persons was destroyed Dec. 29 when incendiary bombs started a fire which gutted the premises of Hitchcock, Williams and Company, manufacturers and shippers situated in the shadow of St. Paul's Cathedral.

The Sir George Williams room, named after the founder of the Association, will rise again after the war. Some years ago United States members of the organization erected a replica in their Chicago headquarters. Plans will be obtained from Chicago and a new site constructed.

The room was first used by George Williams and four others who worked at the Hitchcock Drapery Concern in the early part of the 19th century. Williams, then 20, was an ardent Christian and was concerned because fellow workers showed no interest in a religion.

Williams prayed for power to guide him in his ways and means of leading young men to Christ. Finally a few persons including Edward Beaumont and Edward Vallentine, joined him in prayer in his bedroom. Later the band grew and larger rooms were used.

On June 9, 1844, a meeting was held in Williams' room and the Drapers Evangelical Association was formed. Purpose of the society was to influence "carnal young men" to spread the gospel.

Headquarters were soon transferred to St. Martin's coffee house where on July 4, 1844, the name "Young Men's Christian Association" was adopted.

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Jan. 29 (AP)—Joe (Butcher Boy) Benz, the old spibal ace who is vacationing here, said today he believed "Walter Johnson was the greatest pitcher of all time but Bob Feller is well on the way to becoming the equal of the Big Train."

Benz, who pitched for Chicago White Sox from 1908 through 1919, turned in a no-hit game against Cleveland on May 31, 1914, and missed another no-hitter by the narrowest margin 10 days later when he hurled a one-hit shut-out that beat Johnson and Washington Senators.
