THE KENSINGTON PARK PROPOSAL

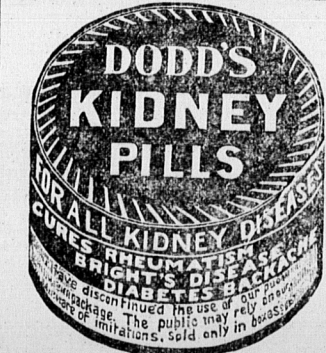
The eastern section of the city has taken hold of the Park project with an energy and enthusiasm that will not be denied. They have justice and borne their part in creating and maintaining Victoria Park at the west end of the city and far removed from their homes. Moreover the creation of the new Park will be a boon to the entire city, by affording a new and attractive breathing place, by adding to the beauty of the city and increasing the value of both civic and private property. At present this avenue of approach to the city is not attractive, but it can be easily and ought to be made so. The Hillsboro bridge has an especial attraction for visitors old and young, as is attested by the numbers that go thither on the fine summer afternoons and holidays for a promenade across the cool and breezy river. When a shady Park with trees and seats are added it must become a popular resort throughout the warm season. Some day we may hope to have street-cars, or a line of omnibuses to carry passengers at a cheap fare from Park to Park, passing the principal hotels each trip. Moreover the New Park will be a step forward in the development of the Greater More Beautiful Charlottetown towards which progress has been making for some years, and which we all hope to see.

THE PROPOSED INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY BOARD.

The Eastern Chronicle of New Glasgow—across—the Straits, which supports the Laurier Government and yet has views of its own, does not think much of Minister Graham's new Board of Management for Intercolonial. The Chronicle says stand off everyone else until he reaches the Minister. We are disappointed. "He is forming a sort of Board, but we must loyally and patiently await the result of the quadripartite operation to consist of men two outside and other is to be Deputy Minister Butler. This board is to meet once a month in Ottawa, which means, of course, that the railway will be run by Deputy Minister Butler. Heretofore there was General Manager Pottinger and Deputy Minister Butler. Hereafter, as soon as the Board is appointed, there will be practically three General Managers and Deputy Minister Butler. We hope a first class railway man would be put in charge with power to stand off everyone else until he reaches the Minister. We are disappointed. Generally speaking even the ministerial press throughout the country has received Mr. Graham's announcement with hesitation. But every one will approve if it should work well, and it may turn out better than is now expected.

MARITIME COMPENSATION FOR THE HUNTERLAND.

The question of compensation to the Maritime Provinces for the vast territories to be given away to Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba was raised the other day in the Senate. Senator Comeau said, brought up. Senator Lougheed, from the prairie, "saw the reason why well-established principles of extending provincial boundaries should be departed from, and the Senate should not be asked to touch it." Sir Richard Cartwright, who speaks for the Government, said the resolution of Senator Comeau was controversial and would take time if pressed. "If anyone thought the Maritime Provinces were unjustly dealt with and submitted a case the Senate should go into that case, but he did not think the Senate should express an opinion in the manner proposed by Senator Comeau's resolution." The resolution of Senator Comeau was very modestly expressed in the words following: "That in the opinion of the Senate, it is desirable that if any change is made in the boundaries of the Provinces of Ontario, Quebec and Manitoba, or any of them, the interests of the Maritime Provinces should be safeguarded by the reservation to the Dominion, for the benefit of the Maritime Provinces, of at least a part of the mineral rights in the territories added to the first named Provinces." The reservation of a part of the mineral rights for the benefit of the Maritime Provinces was all that Senator Comeau claimed. Surely this was a modest enough claim. And we see how it was promptly headed off on both sides by a Conservative Senator's ideas as to the "well-established principles of extending boundaries," and Liberal Sir Richard's almost flippant question, "if any one thought the Maritime Provinces were unjustly dealt with," and the fear that "it would take time" to discuss it. As if the Senate, sitting twenty minutes a day had not time enough to discuss a matter affecting the disposal of three quarters of a million square miles of the public domain! The strangest part of the story is that every other Senator from the Maritime Provinces appears to have been either absent from his place or

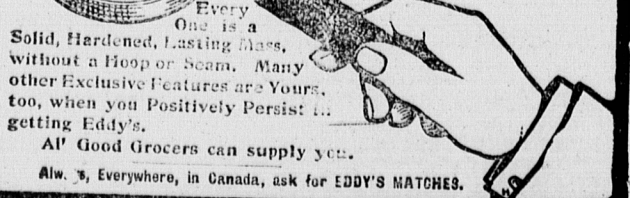
