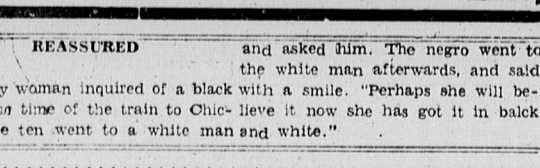

MONTREAL, Que. Sept. 27.—The

ing the total export shipment for  
the season to 1128 as compared with  
250 cases during the same period

# Marine Dept. To Give Employment

## As Far As Practicable—Montreal, Three Rivers, Quebec And Saint John Work Affected By Decision to Prolong Construction Programs.

OTTAWA, Sept. 27.—Harbor im-  
provement works now in progress at  
Montreal, Three Rivers, Quebec and  
Saint John will be continued during  
the winter months as far as is prac-  
ticable in order to give as much em-  
ployment as possible in the difficult  
season, it was learned at the Depart-  
ment of Marine today. These works  
involve the construction of wharves,  
piers and other improvements to  
port facilities.

In the usual course of events such  
work slackens off during the winter  
months. This year the Department  
plans to carry on all work now in  
hand with as little interruption as  
possible.

This work is the ordinary depart-  
ment construction work and is  
wholly apart from the more or less  
extraordinary work which may be  
initiated under the aid of the \$20-  
000,000 unemployment relief fund.

## CAMPAIGN MEETING AT LONG CREEK

More than two hundred and fifty  
citizens of Long Creek and its vic-  
inity attended a district organiza-  
tion meeting of the Prince Edward  
Island Hospital campaign in Long  
Creek Hall Friday night. Edward  
Currie, District Chairman, presided,  
and in several eloquent speeches ex-  
horted his neighbors to co-operate  
heartily and generously in raising the  
\$250,000 for the construction and  
equipment of the new building. Ad-  
dresses made in response to Chair-  
man Currie's appeal by Mr. Neil Mc-  
Cannell and Mr. John McLean assur-  
ed the Charlottetown Committee  
that all the people of Long Creek  
would do their full part in the fund  
raising movement.

The meeting began with a violin  
solo by Miss Kathleen Hornby of  
Charlottetown. District Chairman  
Currie then made his address of wel-  
come, in which he explained the  
purpose of the meeting. Next came  
a vocal solo by Mr. Percy Williams  
of Charlottetown, followed by an ad-  
dress by Mr. W. F. Tidmarsh, of the  
same city, Executive Chairman of  
the campaign.

Chairman Tidmarsh told why it  
would be a waste of money to try  
to enlarge the old Hospital building,  
yet pointed out that the present  
structure had become entirely in-  
adequate to the needs of the commu-  
nity. He enlivened his forceful dis-  
cours with quotations from Sir Wal-  
ter Scott, telling how in ancient days  
the fiery cross was sent through the  
Highlands after impressive can-  
cermonies. Mr. Tidmarsh urged his  
hearers to bear the fiery cross of the  
Hospital's appeal to all parts of their  
territory.

Then came an amusing selection  
by a quartet of Charlottetown sing-  
ers—Mrs. Ewen McKinnon, Mr. Percy  
Williams, Miss Amy Earle and Mr.  
Charles Earle. After another address  
by a visiting speaker, Miss Hornby  
played "Souvenir" and other classi-  
cal pieces on the violin.

Dr. H. D. Johnson, the only sur-  
viving member of the original medi-  
cal staff of the Prince Edward Is-  
land Hospital, enlightened the audi-  
ence on many points concerning the  
institution. He asserted emphatically  
that it was a great mistake for any-  
one to say that the medical staff was  
a close corporation.

"There appears to be an idea in  
certain quarters," Doctor Johnson ad-  
ded, "that the Charlottetown medi-  
cal men shut out the other doctors of  
the Province from practice in the  
Prince Edward Island Hospital. This  
is absolutely incorrect in every re-  
spect. The Prince Edward Island Hos-  
pital is not a closed corporation. Ev-  
ery qualified physician or surgeon in  
any part of Prince Edward Island is  
entitled to attend his patients in our  
Hospital. We accord this full right to  
all recognized members of the medi-  
cal profession, and we welcome ev-  
ery doctor in Prince Edward Island  
to all the courtesies of practice in the  
institution. As its name implies, the  
Hospital is the Prince Edward Is-  
land Hospital—not simply a Char-  
lottetown house of healing."

Three encores were accorded to  
Mr. Charles Earle for his lively ren-  
dition of a humorous song. Mr. Earle  
convulsed the audience with his ex-  
cellent characterizations, and Chair-  
man Currie remarked that they could  
listen to him all night, if it were not  
that it would be an imposition to  
ask him to sing more than four songs  
in succession.
