France, March 21, 1916. Mrs. A. E. Ings:—I received your letter also the three parcels of socks that you so kindly sent me for the boys in the trenches and which they appreciate. They want me to convey to you and the women of Prince Edward Island who knit them, their heartfelt thanks, for the socks could not have come in a better time, as we had only ten or twelve pairs of socks left in a dirty place, where there was six inches of snow one day, and mud to the knees the next; so you see dry feet are a treasure out here this time of the year, especially with a new, clean, pair of socks like the ones that you so kindly sent.

I think the boys that are out here from dear old P. E. Island are as happy and comfortable, as can be, thanks to the good and kind folks at home. "God bless them!" As the Germans are getting uneasy and starting to throw their Jack Johnson's over this way, I will have to close, as we start shooting to let them know that we are still here. "With bells on."

IN MEMORIAM

MISS KATE McCORMACK.

Many friends in this city will regret to learn of the sudden death of Miss Kate McCORMACK, which occurred yesterday at the residence of Mr. Patrick Murnaghan, Dorchester Street. Miss McCORMACK complained of a cold, but nothing serious was anticipated, and her death came as a great shock. Her only surviving relative is a brother, Mr. James McCORMACK of Dorchester, Mass., who is expected to arrive in the city today.

MRS. ANDREW BRYENTON.

At the home of her son-in-law, Mr. David Holmes, Baltic, Lot 18, after a short illness, there passed away, on the morning of March 25th, 1916, Jane Bryenton, wife of the late Andrew Bryenton, aged 76 years. She was a daughter of the late James Cousins, of Barrington, and was the last member of the family. She leaves to mourn one daughter, Mrs. David Holmes, besides a wide circle of relatives and friends. The funeral which was held on Monday, March 27th, was largely attended. Rev. The death occurred at Port Hill on Saturday last of Miss Sophia McIntosh, daughter of Mrs. John McIntosh. Miss McIntosh had been ill for about two weeks only and her death which was unexpected was a severe shock to the family and especially to her aged mother. The funeral which took place on Monday afternoon to Presbyterian Church was considering the bad condition of the roads largely attended. The services at the house, church and grave were conducted by her pastor Rev. Roland Davidson, assisted by Rev. John J. Bamford of St. James Episcopal Church. The pallbearers were Wilfred A. Maynard, John L. Maynard, Harrison Maynard and Arthur Dobie. Miss McIntosh leaves to mourn an aged mother, two sisters, Mrs. Bailey of South Duxbury, Mass and Mrs. McKerson of Atlantic, Mass., also one brother, Mr. James McIntosh at home. PRIVATE JAMES TAYLOR.

The very sad death took place Wednesday night at the Prince Edward Island Hospital, of Pte. Jas. Taylor, of D Company of the 105th, at the age of twenty-four. Since his enlistment in January, Pte. Taylor has been in good health, until a week ago, when he complained of the cold. On Saturday he was stricken with pleurisy and pneumonia, and was taken to the hospital on Monday. Despite the best of attention there he succumbed. Pte. Taylor was born in Newfoundland, but since the death of his parents, in his infancy, he has lived with his aunt, Mrs. Willis Taylor, 61 Richmond St. There are left to mourn two sisters, Clara and Hattie, and one brother, Arthur, all in Newfoundland, besides Mrs. Taylor and family, who looked upon him as a son and brother. The sympathy of the city will go out to the bereaved in this sudden affliction. The members of Pte. Taylor's company have already expressed their grief at the loss of one of their comrades, by sending a suitable floral offering. The funeral takes place today from 61 Richmond Street. The service will begin at 2.15, conducted by Rev. Mr. Fulton.

A deep gloom was cast over the community of Hartsville on Feb. 29th, 1916, when one of its most respected citizens in the person of Rodk MacKAY who while on his way to his work was suddenly stricken with congestion of the brain, from which he died a few hours later.

Intelligent Selection. Not only interest but real value attaches to the question of carefully noting the individual performance of each cow in the herd. It is only after keeping a complete record that one finds such a strange contrast as this: of two five year old cows in one herd, both fresh the same day, both dried off the same week, one gave 5,454 pounds of milk and 213 pounds fat, the other gave only 3,570 pounds of milk and 163 pounds fat. Most probably the owner would not have taken on a bet at the beginning of the season that the one cow could bring in over twenty-one dollars more than the other, but she did.

In another section of two cows the same age, one gave 8,430 pounds of milk and 362 pounds of fat, but the other gave only 1,690 pounds of milk and 67 pounds of fat. Is there a difference of eighty-eight dollars in the earning power of any two cows in your herd?

Building up a profitable dairy herd includes the selection of good individual cows. The rational method is to weigh the milk and test samples regularly for fat. Write to the Dairy Division, Ottawa, for information on cow testing, so that your selection may be larger.
