OTTAWA, Dec. 7 (Special) — Fisheries Minister H. F. G. Bixby told the Guardian's correspondent today that he plans to visit Prince Edward Island on the earliest possible occasion to talk over problems, prices and conditions. Representations on a number of phases of the fishing industry have been made to me here in Ottawa," he said, "by members of the Commons and Senate from Prince Edward Island. ## Interim Force Terms Of Service Revealed

OTTAWA, Dec. 7 (CP) — Ben Phillips, a youth and health is contained in terms of service in the interim force scheduled for both occupation and home duty, it was disclosed tonight. Conditions of service for the interim force include: 1. Age and physical standards similar to that in the active army. 2. Continuation of present active service rates of pay and allowances. 3. Volunteers will be accepted from N. F. M. A. ranks but members of the force must serve without territorial limitation. 4. Recruiting is restricted to former and present members of the army and reserves will not be enlisted. 5. Nursing service sisters will be enlisted but there is no provision for C. W. A. C. personnel, thus foregoing the disbandment of that organization. 6. Interim personnel will decide March 31, 1946, on whether they wanted to join the permanent active army, continue in the interim force until Sept. 30, 1947, when it disbands, or accept their discharge honorably and be charged from the interim force. Officers must have junior matriculation for promotion. In armored, artillery, infantry, signals and army service corps lieutenants may not be over 28 years of age, Captains 32, Majors 35, and Lieutenant-Colonels 40. Higher age limits by two to 10 years, according to ranks, will apply in other corps. In all officer selections preference will be given to younger applicants wherever possible.

## 12,000 Canadians Arrive In N. Y.

The men were held aboard the 85,000-ton Cunard liner through a long day until their trains were ready, passing the time by crowding the weather decks for a glimpse of the New York skyline. The women were held aboard the 22,000-ton liner Jersey City, and from Grand Central terminal in Manhattan. The four trains leaving Grand Central, bore sick and tired Canadian veterans to a close-up view of Manhattan as they were carried across the city in buses.

Mr. Keenan said previous delays in starting the trials were to respect the rights of other countries and to show that the United States was not taking a "high-handed attitude."

## BIG THREE FOREIGN SECRETARIES TO MEET

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (AP) — The Foreign Ministers of Britain, the United States and Russia will meet in Moscow Dec. 15, the State Department announced tonight, to tackle an array of critical international issues including control of atomic energy. State Secretary Byrnes is planning to fly to the Russian capital, probably leaving Washington early next week. It is considered improbable that he will be home by Christmas. This will be the first meeting of Mr. Byrnes, Foreign Secretary Bevin and Foreign Commissar Molotov since the breakdown of the London council of foreign ministers in September. The fact they have agreed to meet again is considered a hopeful sign for improvement in relations among the three countries. The plan for the meeting in Moscow was suggested by Mr. Byrnes Nov. 24, the State Department said.

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Erig. Gen. Eduardo Gomes, liberal-backed candidate of the National Democratic Union, is expected to be the victor in Brazil's presidential election, which ends the 17-year dictatorship. Final results of the voting are not expected for several weeks.
