MOBBED A CHINESE FUNERAL.

Boston Crowd Attacks Mourners and is Clubbed by Police.

Boston, June 29.—What was probably the most imposing Chinese funeral procession ever seen on this continent was charged by a mob Monday and it was not until the police, with drawn clubs, had dispersed the rioters that the mourners could continue on their way to the Cemetery.

The funeral was that of Chin Lun Yen, one of the wealthiest and best known Chinamen in the country. Elaborate preparations had been made for it, and Chinamen from all parts of New England and New York had come here to attend it. Chin Lun Yen was a Free-Mason and the 500 Chinamen in the procession wore the emblems of the order. The cortege had reached Dudley street, when a great crowd of men and boys, rushed upon it. The demonstrations took the police by surprise, Captain Cain and his squad charged upon the mob again and again, and many of the assailants were handled severely before they would allow the procession to pass.

The police believe the killing of Americans in China led to the trouble and extra precautions were taken to guard Chinatown that night.

Q. C. Appointments Cancelled

These all have Q. C. commissions from Ottawa and are understood to hold the view that as the commission is from Her Majesty it is good in all her courts, so that it is not necessary to take out the provincial commission, which requires an outlay of \$20. If the right of precedence of any of the above is at any time questioned in the provincial courts then a test case will be made to settle the question as to the right of Q. C.'s appointed from Ottawa in the provincial courts.—St. John Globe.

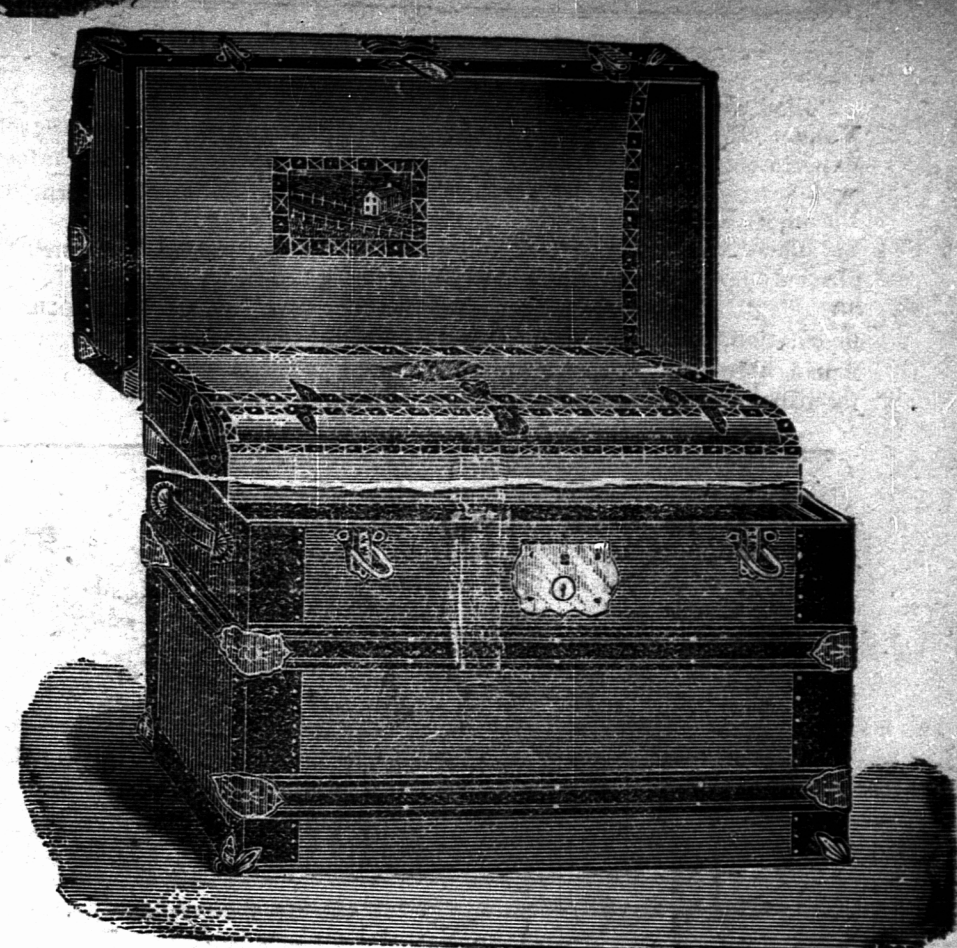

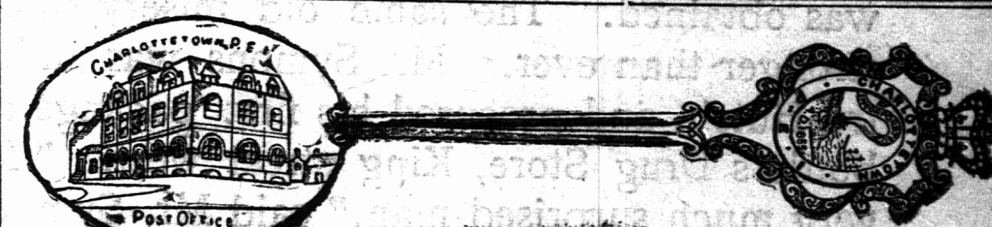
