Prairie Factories Have Annual Output Of Many Millions

MANUFACTURING IN WESTERN PROVINCES IS MAKING GREAT STRIDES. — MANITOBA IN LEAD.

OTTAWA, Dec. 19.—Although Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta are commonly supposed in Eastern Canada to be exclusively devoted to agriculture, it is interesting to note from a return just made available by the Bureau of Statistics that the Prairie Provinces have an annual manufacturing production of more than \$200,000,000.

Premier Baldwin Impressed With Canada's Beauty

LONDON, Eng., Dec. 19.—Premier Stanley Baldwin, in formally opening the new Kingston-by-pass road recently, said he was struck during his recent visit to Canada, by the beauty of the homes and gardens of the people of all classes, along the roads on which he had been driven. Speaking of the roads in England, Mr. Baldwin declared there was nothing that visitors from overseas cared to see in the country villages and country lanes. He advocated their development and deprecated any "ugly surroundings" or "hoggish behaviour" on these roads.

Speaking of the Kingston road which he was opening, the Premier said: "The main aim of this great road, may be traced back to those days when we were most anxious about unemployment, shortly after the conclusion of the Great War. The Government of the day felt great anxiety on the subject, and they set up a scheme of road work."

"New roads such as these will do for London what is of the greatest importance, they will bring along these great arteries a wealth of real country. If we make these roads what they may be, the road of our dreams, we shall incur the gratitude not only of our own fellow countrymen, but of visitors from overseas. There is nothing that touches them more than our country villages and our country lanes. They like to look on England as a sanctuary and a shrine. We are making a new start with these roads. Local authorities today have far-reaching powers. We can regulate advertising. We can go in for town planning, and there has been recent legislation on the control of building lines.

"Roads around London for too many years past have consisted of mean-looking houses and dingy forecourts. Let us try, if we can, to have along these roads houses with gardens. Nothing strikes me so much during my recent visit to Canada, right through the cities of the west, as to see beautiful houses and gardens, not of high people, but belonging to people of all classes right up to the top, carefully tended and looked after. It made it a pleasure to drive out into the country from any of those western cities. "It is supposed to be an advantage to a doctor to have a good bedside all our people had good roadside manners. There ought to be an unwritten code that the deffling of any of these great roads by ugly surroundings, by hoggish behaviour, spilling litter, or by upsetting or spilling litter upon them, should be to har any man from entering any decent club or any decent home circle."

BERLIN, Dec. 19.—Grand Admiral Von Thripitz, who was responsible for Germany's wartime submarine campaign, declared yesterday in an interview with United Press, that he would wholeheartedly favor Secretary Willbur's new naval program, were he an American. "I am certain, he is provided," he said, "it is necessary to provide for emergency."

JERUSALEM, Dec. 19.—The tenth anniversary of the liberation of Jerusalem was observed Friday with the customary state service in the Anglican Cathedral by Field Marshal Lord Plumer and his principal officials. The service was conducted in English, Arabic, Hebrew, Greek and Armenian, and the Patriarch of the Orthodox and the Armenian services took part.

After the services the High Commissioner held an investiture at which the insignia of British honours or recently gazetted were bestowed upon local officials. Later Lord Plumer, sent messages to King George and General Allenby.
