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His Sword in Their Loins.

Lord Roberts is striking with a bold hand straight heart of the Transvaal. Thrust follows thrust with a rapidity which has evidently disconcerted the Boers and broken through close on their heels, he gives them no time to strengthen themselves in a new position. Before they can get their breath and intrench themselves sufficiently to give them a chance of disputing his advance, his cavalry and mounted infantry are pressing upon their flanks and threatening their lines of communication. And if they linger a little; through the very shame of running farther, his infantry comes up in irresistible strength, and his artillery is thrown forward to overwhelm them with a crushing fire. So, the poor Boers, having Cronje's fate ever in mind, take to their heels again, and Lord Roberts starts after them on his remorseless hunt.

Yesterday, when commenting on the report that the Boers had determined to make a very stubborn stand at the Klip river, we greatly questioned the probability of their doing so. We said that, as they had abandoned the lines of the Yet, the Zand, the Rhenoster and the Vaal, it might well be doubted that they would make a stubborn fight on the line of the Klip. What we thought has come true within twenty-four hours. They made no fight at all. Lord Roberts reached the Klip river yesterday afternoon, after a march of twenty miles, and the Boers fled before him. Though they had prepared several positions, they abandoned one after the other as the British army drew near. Lord Roberts' headquarters, by the midnight news, was only eighteen miles from Johannesburg, and his cavalry was riding within ten miles of that golden city. Truly, he has kept his sword in the loins of the flying foe.

Mr. Campbell asked why the Local Government had not received a copy of the plans and specifications.

Mr. Shaw—Mr. Peters states that there are specifications and Mr. Farquharson said there were not any specifications. Who is telling the truth?

Mr. McLean again referred to the letter by Mr. Pineau.

Mr. Speaker—I have already given my decision.

Mr. McLean continuing said he was going to have freedom of speech and no Leader or no Speaker paid by the Government could prevent him from freely expressing himself.

Cries of Chair!

Mr. Speaker again ruled.

Mr. Shaw asked why the Speaker had called him to order.

Mr. Speaker—When the Speaker rises in his place Hon. members must sit down.

Hon. Jas. R. McLean said the ruling of the Speaker must be obeyed.

Mr. Campbell wanted to adjourn the House and the Government would be able to obtain the specifications of the bridge.

Mr. A. A. McLean continuing said that he had always respected the ruling of the chair. He could produce a petition signed by 400 of the electors of Mr. Pineau's constituency, asking him to resign his seat. He could show that Mr. Pineau had no seat in any legislature in Canada. He could go to the press with the letter.

Mr. A. J. McDonald of Georgetown continued the debate. He was followed by Mr. Campbell who was speaking when the House adjourned to meet to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.
