On the shaft the words, "Built of a Peoples Love, in Memory of Our Glorious Dead" and on the base, "At the Going Down of the Sun, and in the Morning, We Will Remember Them."

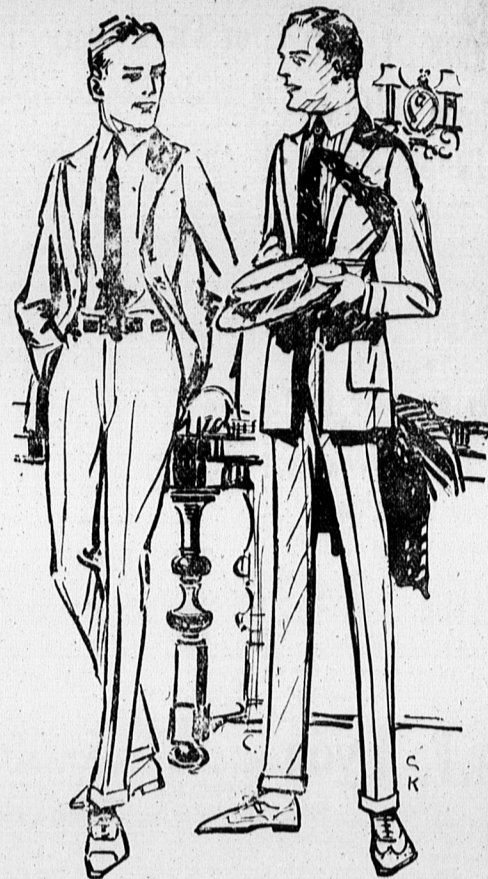
