It now transpires that the total differences in duties in the ten years in question amounted to but \$22,311 and this arose through discounts, and the difference in freight between the point of manufacture and the point of shipment. It was therefore unnecessary that the firm should admit any undervaluation, but merely arrange a settlement with the Customs in the matter of duty, which was accordingly done.


